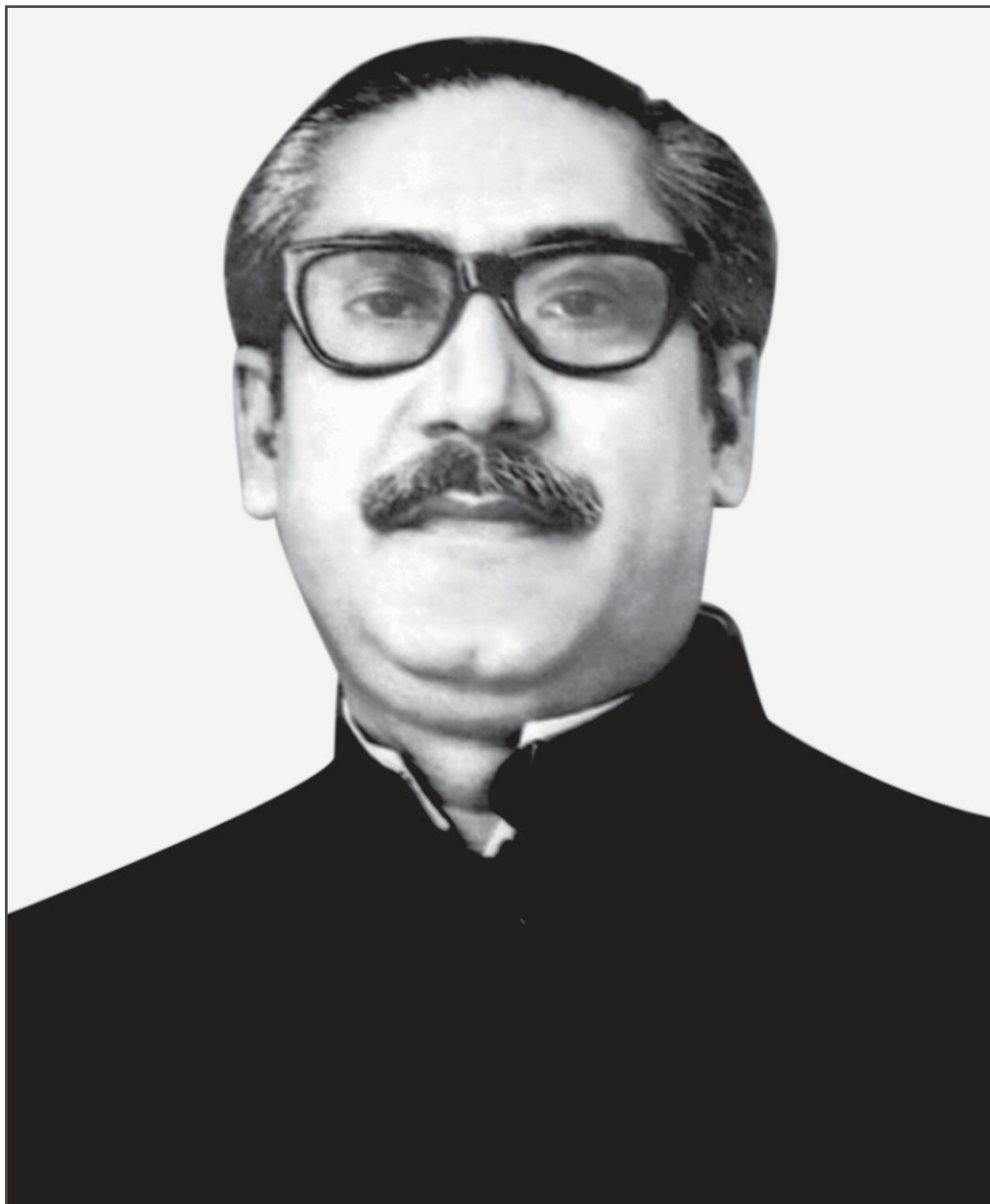

The World leaders hailed Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman amid nationwide celebrations marking the Mujib Year. The Economic Relations Division (ERD) is also celebrating the occasion with special focus on the life and works of Bangabandhu. Notably, the Mujib Borsho has coincided with a time when Bangladesh has met all the criteria to graduate from the Least Developed Country (LDC) group by the Committee for Development Policy of the United Nations. Bangladesh is the first country that has been recommended for graduation by meeting all the three criteria including GNI per capita, Human Assets Index (HAI), and Economic and Environmental Vulnerability Index (EVI). This is certainly the most significant achievement for the nation at a time when the country is celebrating the birth centenary of the Father of the Nation.

To commemorate this historic achievement, a media briefing was organized at the Ganabhaban on 27 February 2021. Hon'ble Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina graced the event with her kind presence and spoke to the media about this historic achievement. Hon'ble Prime Minister, in her speech, extended her heartiest congratulations to the Bangladeshi citizens both at home and abroad for achieving this feat. During the event, Hon'ble Finance Minister Mr. A H M Musatafa Kamal, FCA, MP handed over CDP's recommendation letter on Bangladesh's LDC graduation to the Hon'ble Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

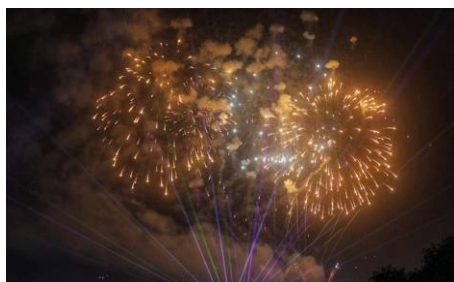

## GOLDEN JUBILEE OF OUR INDEPENDENCE

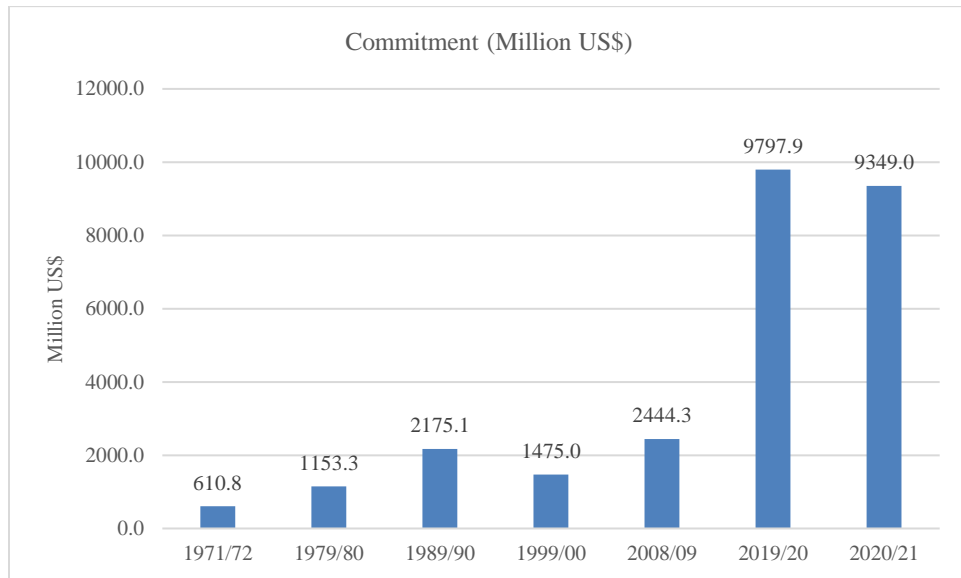
Bangladesh is celebrating the 50 years of its independence and the birth centenary of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. These two grand events at this point of time has made this year particularly special and historic.

Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman led the nation towards freedom with a dream to ensure equity and prosperity for the people. Despite the devastation that the liberation war left behind, he moved ahead with bold initiatives for development relying on the fighting spirit of his people. Realizing the importance of development planning to make the dreams come true, he set up the National Planning Commission in 1972.

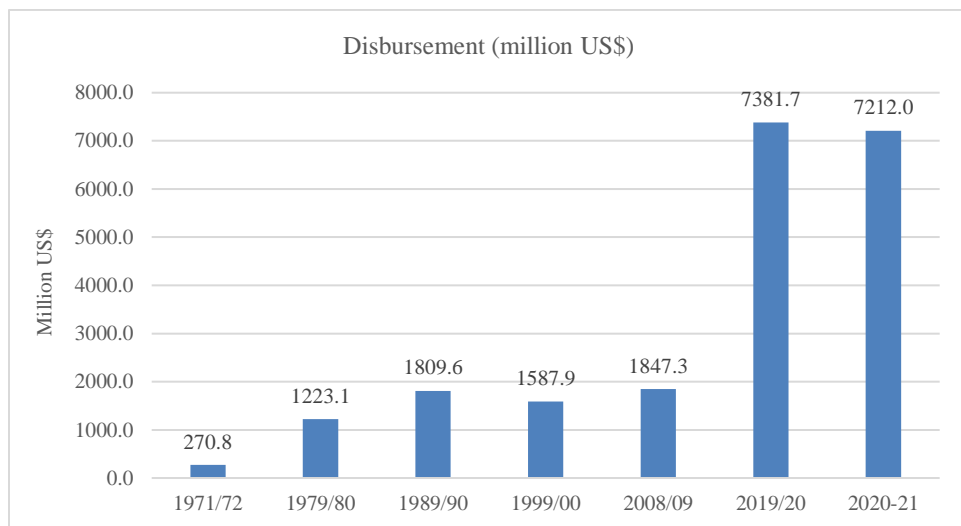
The daunting task of eradicating poverty and ensuring prosperity began with writing a Constitution in 1972 and formulating the first Five Year Plan for the period 1973-1978. The Plan aimed to provide a sense of direction and determine the order of priorities within the national development framework supported by consistent policies.

After 50 years of independence, Bangabandhu's dream of building a 'Sonar Bangla' is now being implemented under the bold and visionary leadership of his daughter our Hon'ble Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina. The remarkable performance of Bangladesh Economy under her leadership during the last one decade has uplifted the image of the country tremendously and the country is now considered a development miracle in the world.

The development initiatives of Bangladesh have been befittingly complimented by the assistance from the development partners (DP). The continued efforts to build partnership with the global community resulted into sustained and consistent flow of commitment and disbursement from overseas. Total commitment increased by 16 times from USD 610.80 million in FY 1971/72 to USD 9797.874 million in FY 2019/20. Data show that the amount of commitment during the first four decades grew slowly but gained significant pace during the last one decade. During the period FY 2008/09 to FY 2019/20 the amount of commitment increased by more than 4 times from USD 2.4 billion to USD 9.8 billion.

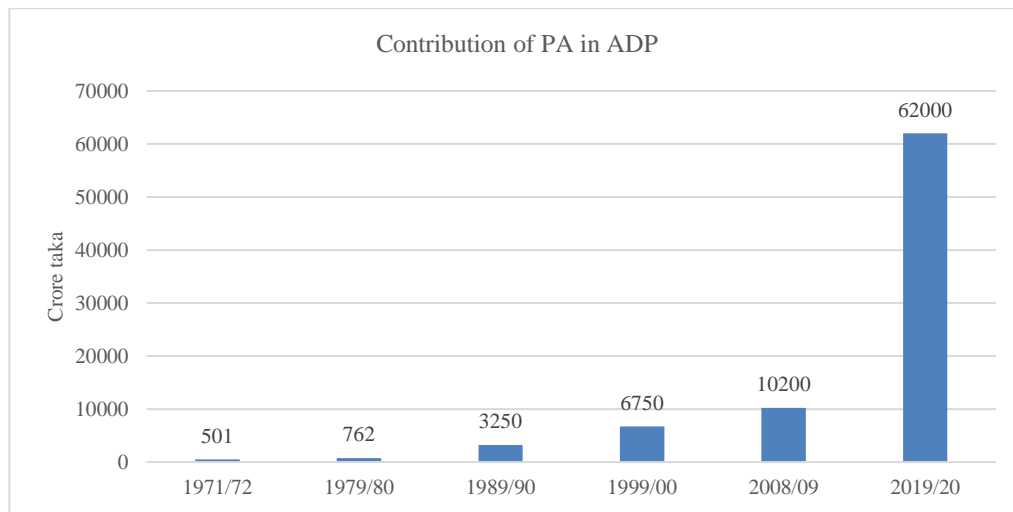


Similar pattern has also been observed for the figures of actual disbursement of assistance from the development partners. Total disbursement increased by more than 27 times from USD 270.8 million in FY 1971/72 to USD 7381.72 million in FY 2019/20.



However, during FY 2020/21, owing to the pandemic, both the commitment and disbursement remained stuck to similar level of FY 2019/20.

Contribution of Project Aid (PA) in ADP has also witnessed a remarkable rise during the last five decades. While the size of Project Aid was around Tk. 501 crore in 1971/72, it rose to around Tk. 62,000 crore in 2019/20. Clearly, Project Aid also increased with considerable pace since independence matching with the progress of the country. Compared to FY 2008/09 PA increased by more than 6 times from BDT 10,200 crore to BDT 62,000 crore in 2019/20.



Despite small territorial land and huge population, Bangladesh has remarkably achieved self-sufficiency in food. The country is now the 4th largest producer of rice, the 3rd largest producer of inland fish and the 3rd largest producer of vegetables in the world. Therefore, Bangladesh has not taken any food aid (quantity) since FY 1985/86. The grant for food aid also reduced significantly from USD 181.65 million in FY 1972/73 to USD 10.71 million in FY 2019/20.

Bangladesh is now steadily and firmly marching ahead with a vision to become a developed country by 2041. Prudent policy reforms along with the initiatives to create an enabling business environment supported by attractive fiscal and financial incentives have made Bangladesh an attractive investment destination. Process of establishment of 100 Economic Zones has generated further incentives for the foreign investors.

The commendable economic progress of Bangladesh has been noted by the global community. The annual GDP growth rate of Bangladesh over the last one decade has been one of the highest in the world. Before the pandemic hit the economies around the world in early 2020, Bangladesh achieved a commendable 8.15% growth rate in FY 2018/19. Even when the world economy was struggling with the adverse impact of Covid-19, Bangladesh has done fairly well and maintained a positive growth trajectory. The IMF has recently projected that the country would regain the momentum soon and would regain normal pace of pre-Covid period. Bangladesh has always followed prudent fiscal and monetary policies and the debt/GDP ratio remained well below the threshold level. The absence of the risk of debt distress helped Bangladesh to undertake bold expansionary policies to combat the pandemic hit economy. As a result, the Government has been able to extend crucial safety net supports to the vulnerable population of country during this difficult time.

It is now anticipated that the economy is going to rebound soon with strong performance of the agricultural, the manufacturing and the service sectors. Per capita income of the country has already increased from USD 759 in 2009 to USD 2,227 in 2021 and going to increase further as the economy returns to normal state. As a recognition of stable performance of both the economic and social sectors of the country, Bangladesh has been recommended by the CDP this year to graduate from the LDC group. The key driving factors of the robust performance of Bangladesh has been the digital revolution and massive infrastructure development initiatives that has made the supply chain smooth and efficient. This has resulted into stable price level and sustained income of the people.

Bangladesh is following an inclusive development policy that entails the philosophy of “leaving no-one behind”. It is designed to be implemented gradually by addressing the lifecycle risks. The government has taken special program for improving living standards of the disadvantaged groups and has widened the social safety net. In this regard, digital cash transfer scheme to disburse money directly to 5 million households through digital platforms has been executed. In 2020-21, total allocation for social security schemes was USD 9.6 billion. The amount was equivalent to 16.8% of the total budget and 3% of GDP.

Realizing that ensuring energy security is a major prerequisite for robust economic growth, Bangladesh has adopted sustainable strategies like Power System Master Plan along with some flagship mega projects to bring electricity to all the households of the country by 2021- a major target set for the Mujib Borsho (Mujib Year).

To develop the road transport network, the government has undertaken important projects such as the Padma Multipurpose Bridge, Mass Rapid Transit (MRT), Dhaka Elevated Expressway, Karnaphuli Tunnel and other mega projects that are going to be instrumental in enhancing Bangladesh’s economic growth. Rapid expansion of rural

road network, improvement of waterways, railways, and airways have also paved way for faster economic growth.

Despite all the potentials, potentials risks that can reverse the progress are posing challenge. Climate change and global warming, outbreak of infectious disease, intrusion of salinity, increased frequency of natural disaster and the fourth industrial revolution (4IR) will surely test our endurance and capacity. Foreseeing these challenges, specific and long-term policies such as the Bangladesh Delta Plan 2100 are being formulated and implemented with the guidance and leadership of the Hon'ble Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

The global community is now standing at a crossroad where the dynamics of opportunities and threats are at their highest level of complexity. However, Bangladesh has a substantial pool of hard-working and intelligent human resources with a visionary leader guiding them. Therefore, Bangladesh will surely emerge as a prosperous nation that other countries nations will take as a source of inspiration.

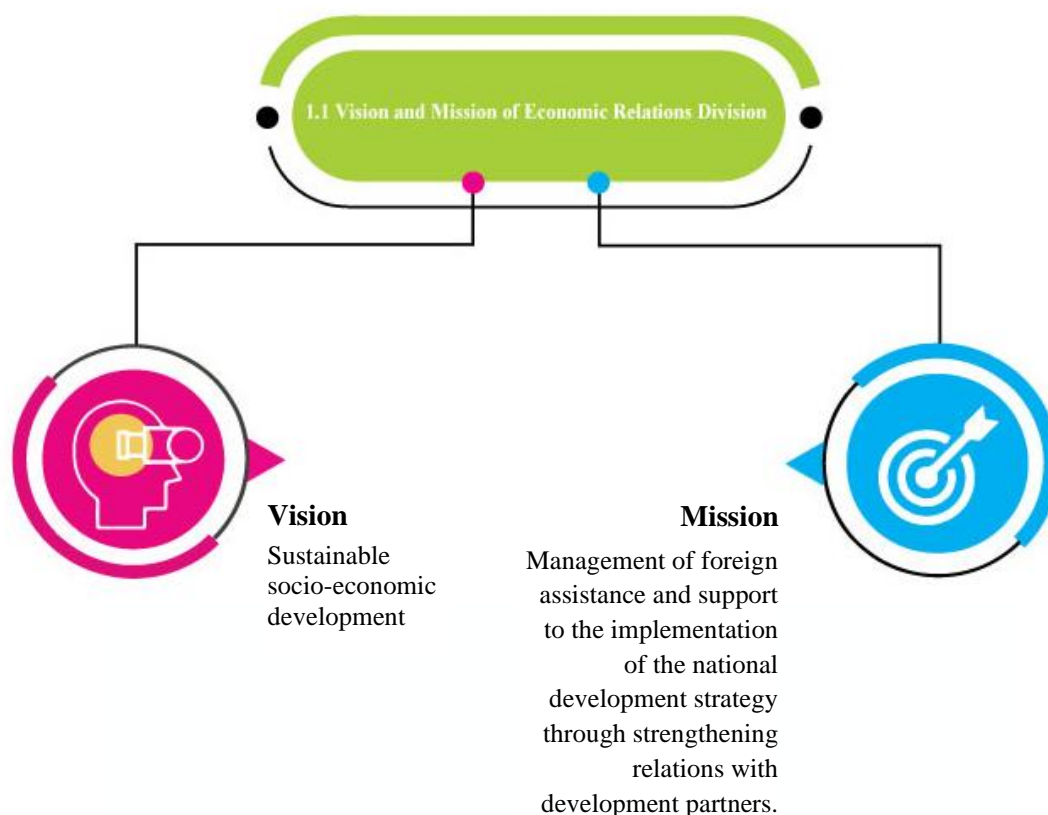

# CHAPTER 1

## INTRODUCTION TO THE ECONOMIC RELATIONS DIVISION

## 1.1 Vision and Mission of Economic Relations Division



## 1.2 Major Functions of Economic Relations Division

ERD is one of the four Divisions of the Ministry of Finance (MoF), Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh. Previously this division was named as External Resource Division and its name was changed in 1990 as "Economic Relations Division".

ERD is responsible for mobilizing the external resources for the socio-economic development of Bangladesh. This division leads as the focal point of the Government for interfacing with the development partners as well as for coordination of all external assistance inflows into the country. It assesses the needs of external assistance, devises a strategy for negotiations and mobilizing foreign assistance, formalizes and enables aid mobilization through the signing of loans and grants agreements, determines and executes external economic policy. According to the Allocation of Business, among the Different Ministries and Divisions (Schedule 1 of the Rules of Business, 1996) the functions of ERD are as follows:

1. Assessment, mobilization, negotiation and allocation of all multilateral and bilateral economic aid for implementation of development projects under Annual Development Programme;
2. Examination and scrutiny of proposals for foreign aid (Loans, grants, etc.) received from Ministries/Divisions for allocation and identification of sources thereof;
3. Mobilization, negotiation and allocation of external assistance relating to food and commodity assistance from bilateral and multilateral sources;
4. Coordination and processing for approval of all technical assistance programs including assessment of requirement of negotiation with bilateral donors and multilateral agencies;
5. Policies and coordination of matters related to employment of Bangladeshi nationals as experts and consultants in aided projects;
6. Policies and procedures for appointment of expatriate consultants and technical assistance experts;
7. Guidelines and procedures for tendering involving funds provided under external aid;
8. Coordination, review and monitoring of the utilization of foreign aid;

### 1.3. Organizational Structure

The Secretary, ERD, is the head of administrative and the Principal Accounting Officer of this division. The distribution of work in ERD is divided into 10 (Ten) wings. Each Wing comprises of branches. A branch is considered as a self-contained unit which again consists of a number of desks/sections. There are six categories of branches which are organized on the basis of specific areas of responsibilities as follows:

#### **Programming:**

There are branches based on specific development partners, countries and agencies. These branches are responsible for promotion of economic cooperation with development partners falling within the sphere of their responsibilities.

**Administration and General Services:** These are based on administrative and support service works.

**Coordination:** These are branches for coordination works.

**External Economic Policy (EEP):** These branches are dedicated for policy and research matters.

**Foreign Aid Budget and Accounts (FABA):** FABA is responsible for Foreign Aid Accounts.

**Fellowship and Foundation (F&F):** To mobilize foreign trainings and higher education fellowships programmes.

Detail information about the functions and activities of the wings, branches, and sections are mentioned below:

#### **Wing-1: America and Japan**

There are 2 branches (duty posts), 2 supernumerary branches and 3 sections under this wing

#### **Wing-2: World Bank**

This wing consists of 3 branches (duty posts), 6 supernumerary branches and sections

#### **Wing-3: Administration and Middle East**

There are 2 branches (duty posts), 1 supernumerary branch and 10 sections under this wing

#### **Wing-4: United Nation**

This wing consists of 2 branches (duty posts), 5 supernumerary branches and 2 sections

#### **Wing-5: Asian Development Bank (ADB)**

This wing consists of 2 branches (duty posts), 2 supernumerary branches and 3 sections

#### **Wing-6: Coordination and Nordic**

There are 2 branches (duty posts), 2 supernumerary branches and 4 sections under this wing

#### **Wing-7: Europe**

There are 2 branches (duty posts) and 4 supernumerary branches under this wing

#### **Wing-8: Asia and JEC, Fellowship and Foundation**

There are 3 branches (duty posts), 3 supernumerary branches and 4 sections under this wing

#### **Wing 9: Foreign Aid Budget and Accounts**

This wing consists of 2 branches (duty posts), 4 supernumerary branches, 2 sections and 1 ICT Cell

#### **Wing 10: Development Effectiveness**

This wing consists of 3 branches (duty posts), 2 supernumerary branches and 4 sections

## **1.5 Overall Scenario of Foreign Assistance Management FY 2020-21**

According to vision 2041, one of the main targets of the present government's long-term development strategy under second PP 2041 is to establish Bangladesh as a Upper middle-income country (UMIC) by FY 2031 and Higher Income Country (HIC) by 2041. To achieve this target as well as to fuel the growth demand of the country, the government has placed consistent emphasis on increasing investment in the development sector. Bangladesh is in right track to achieve its vision of reaching the upper middle-income country (UMIC) status by 2031. It is an outcome of the prudent fiscal policy and financial management of the government. To reach the UMIC level by 2031, according to the 8<sup>th</sup> Five-Year Plan, the GDP growth rate should gradually increase from 7.4% to 8.51% in 2025 fiscal year (average 7.98% from 2021 to 2025). Therefore, the investment which was 32.0% in 2019-20, should also gradually increase to 37% of GDP in FY 2025. Considering the constraints on providing resources from internal sources, foreign assistance is essential in the current financial management to meet investment demand as per development goals. Under the Government's Rules of Business, ERD is concerned with the search and collection of foreign assistance.

Furthermore, the collection and effective utilization of foreign assistance are essential to meet the investment demand in consideration of the FY 2021. Bangladesh's total public investment target was set at 8.1% of GDP in the budget of the financial year 2021. The government's budget deficit was set to be financed by a net foreign assistance of 2.5% of GDP. ERD is striving to collect significant foreign assistance to accomplish the investment needs in the social front, including health, electricity, transportation, physical infrastructure and education. Moreover, since COVID-19 is still ongoing, like last FY2020, ERD has given special attention in FY 21 to collect additional foreign assistance out of regular assistance as budget support, vaccine support & project support to combat the situation as well as to recovery the economy.

Commitments received from last five fiscal years, i.e. from 2016-17 to 2020-21 amounts to USD 61.99 billion, which is an average of USD 12.39 billion per FY. At the same time, the disbursement of foreign assistance amounts to USD 31.56 billion which is an average of USD 6.31 billion per FY. The amounts of commitment and disbursement of foreign assistance in the FY 2020-21 are USD 9.349 billion and USD 7.212 (provisional) billion respectively. In FY 2021, COVID-19 related commitment and disbursement are USD 3.276 and USD 1.194 billion out of total commitment and total disbursement respectively.

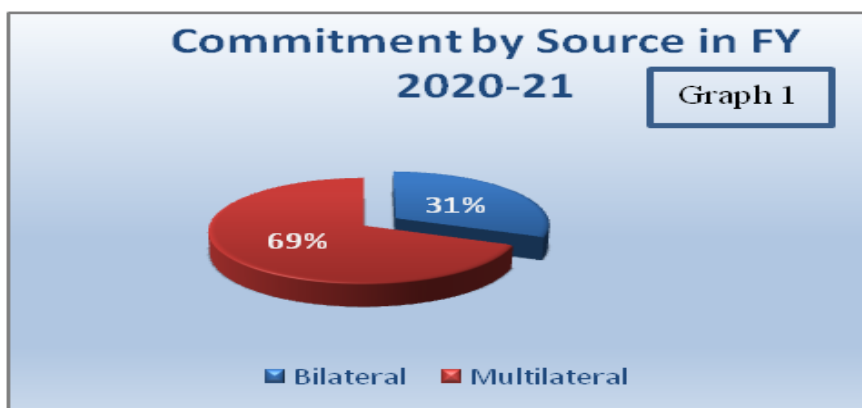
### **1.5.1 The achievements of the overall activities of ERD in FY 2020-21**

#### **Foreign Assistance Mobilization**

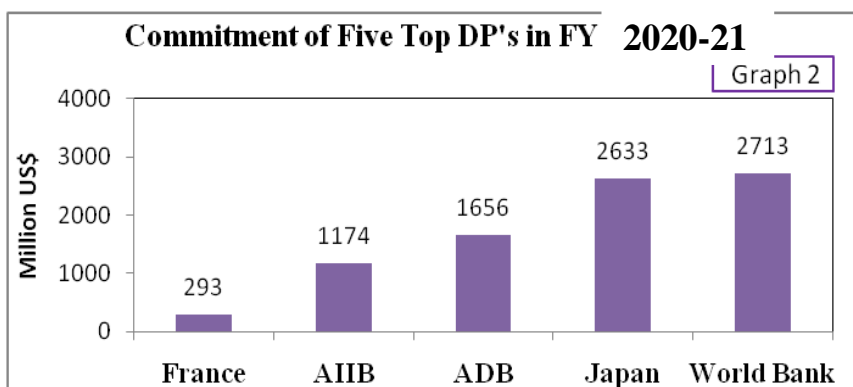
Under the Foreign Assistance Collection Programme, a total commitment of USD 9349.94 million has been signed in FY 2020-21. Of these, the grant amount and the loan amount are USD 673.61 million and USD 8676.33 million, respectively. The target for foreign assistance (commitment) was set at USD 6000.00 million in the FY 2020-21; against which the commitment was achieved by 155.83%. During

this fiscal year, the highest foreign assistance (commitment) amounting USD 2713.30 million was received from the World Bank among the multilateral development partners.

The maximum commitments were received from Japan among the bilateral development partners, amounting to USD 2633.08 million. Most of the total commitment to foreign assistance has come from the bilateral sources. The rate of commitments from multilateral and bilateral sources can be seen in **Graph 1**.



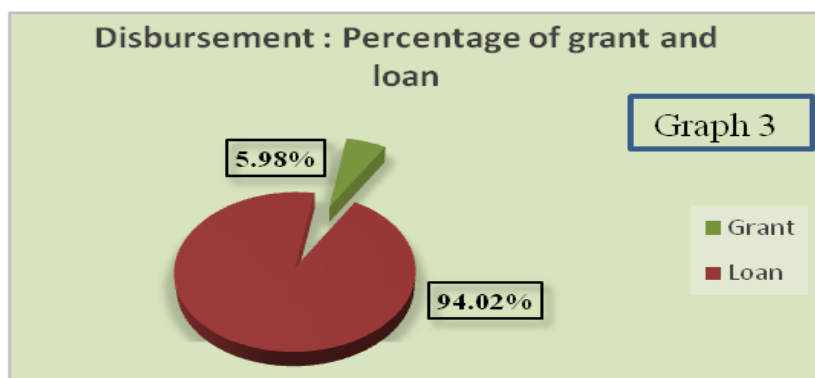
On the other hand the amount of five major development partner commitments in FY 21 is shown in **Graph 2**.



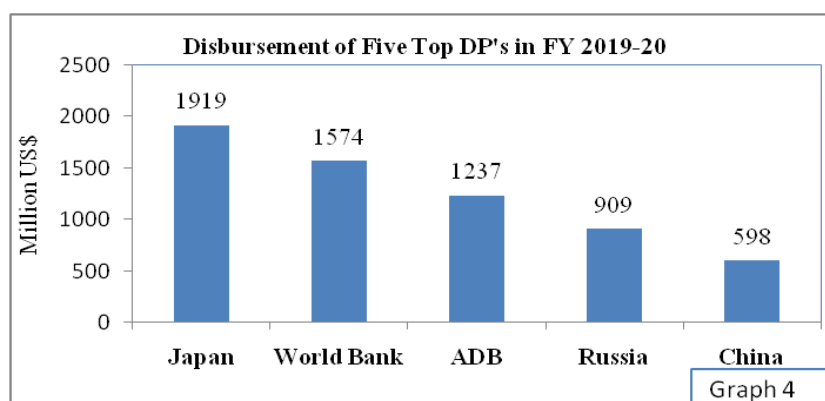
In FY 2020-21, a total of 81 agreements have been signed with 23 development partners for foreign assistance, of which 56 are grant agreements and 25 are loan agreements. Development partner wise Commitment in FY 2020-21 is cited in **Annexure-3**.

### Disbursement of Foreign Assistance

In FY 2020-21, the total disbursement of foreign assistance amounts to USD 7212.13 million. Of these, the grant and the loan amounts are USD 430.96 million and USD 6781.17 million respectively. The ratio of loan and grant in the total disbursement is presented in **Graph 3**.

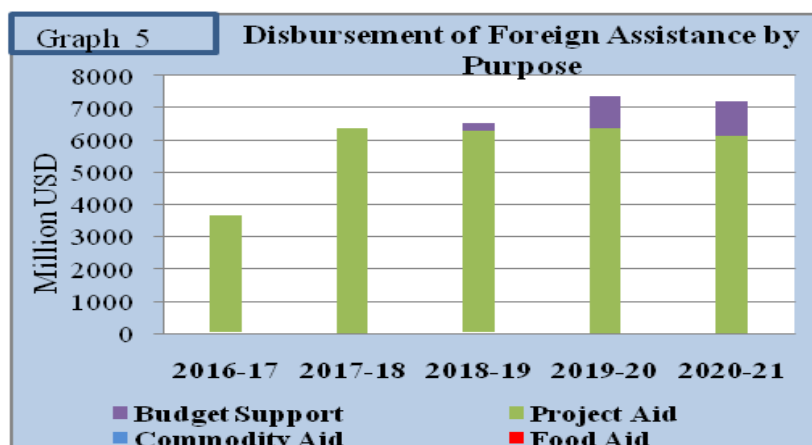


On the other hand the amount of disbursement of five major development partners disbursement in FY 21 is shown in **Graph 4**.



In the aforesaid fiscal year, the revised target for disbursement of foreign assistance as per RADP was USD 8238 million, against which 87.55% was disbursed. Out of this total amount of disbursement (FY 2020-21), USD 3338.85 million has come from the multilateral sources, whereas USD 3873.28 million was received from the bilateral sources. Among the multi-lateral sources, the highest disbursement of USD 1573.98 million came from the World Bank in this fiscal year. At the same time, Japan topped the list among all the bilateral sources with the disbursement amount of USD 1919.19 million. Details of total disbursement by development partners are presented in **Annexure-4**.

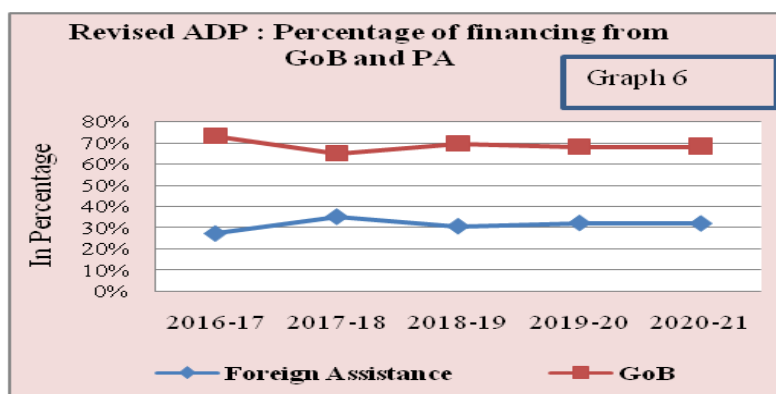
In the FY 2020-21, out of foreign assistance, the amount of food assistance and project assistance are USD 16.18 million and USD 7195.95 million respectively. During this time, an amount of USD 1098.00 million budget support was received. However, in the past few years, there has been no disbursement for commodity assistance. The information regarding the purpose of disbursement in last several years is presented in **Graph-5** below:



Based on a primary estimate, at the end of the FY 2019-20, the amount of foreign assistance in the pipe line has increased around USD 49.64 billion (provisional). Out of this, an amount of USD 61.99 billion has been added to the foreign assistance commitment pipeline in the last five fiscal years, i.e. from FY 2015-16 to FY 2019-20. This amount of commitment is supposed to be disbursed within the next five to six years. However, since the foreign assistance disbursement is directly related to the implementation of the projects, the disbursement is largely dependent on the efficiency of the project implementing Ministry/Division.

### 1.5.2 Annual Development Programme (ADP)

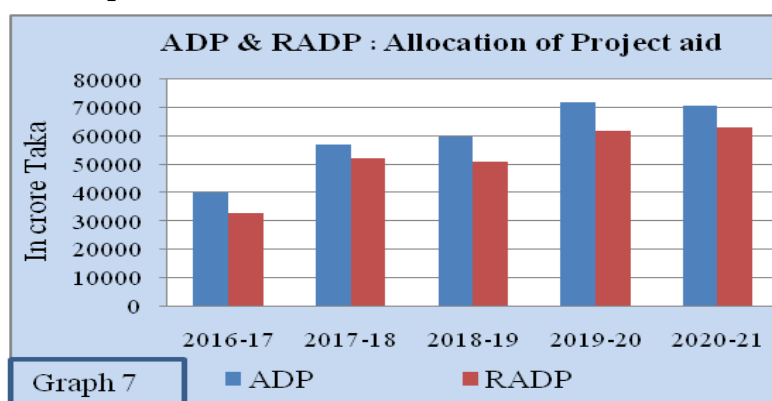
Although the dependence on foreign assistance in financing Annual Development Programmes (ADPs) is steadily declining, a significant portion of such programs are still being executed by foreign assistance. In the revised ADP of FY 2020-21, the amount of foreign assistance as project assistance amounts 31.87% of the total ADP size. A comparative picture of the financing ratio from the Government of Bangladesh and foreign assistance in the revised ADP of the last five years is shown in **Graph-6**.



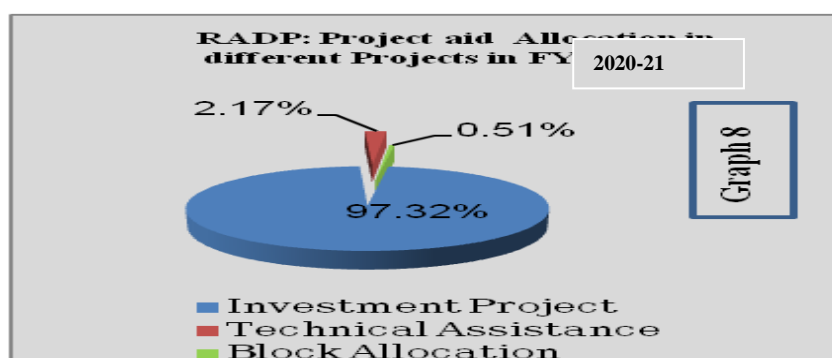
In the FY 2020-21, the allocation for project assistance in the ADP amounted BDT 70,502.00 crore (USD 8294.00 million) while the allocation for food assistance was BDT 212.00 crore (USD 25.00 million). Due to the decrease in the demand for project assistance of the Ministries/Divisions implementing the project, the

allocation of project assistance amounting BDT 63,000.00 crore (USD 7411.00 million) and food assistance of BDT 212.00crore (USD 25.00 million) were made to the revised ADP in this FY.

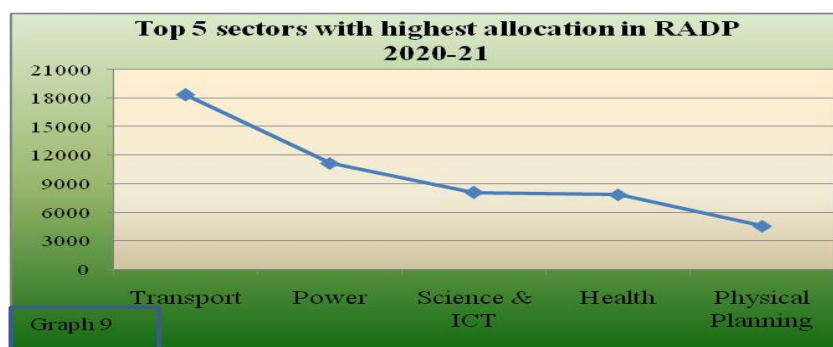
The allocation of the project assistance to the revised ADP for the FY 2019-20 was BDT 62,000.00 crore (USD 7294.00 million) that is, in FY 2020-21, the allocation of project assistance to the revised ADP has increased by 1.61% as compared to FY 2019-20. It should be noted that since the independence, the allocation of project assistance in the revised ADP for all fiscal years has been lower than that of ADP. The allocation of project assistance in ADP and RADP in the last five FYs is displayed in **Graph-7**.



The total number of foreign-assistance projects in the revised ADPs in FY 2020-21 is 308, out of which 103 are technical assistance projects and 205 are investment projects. In this FY, an amount of BDT 61312.17 crore was allocated for investment projects, while BDT 1367.39 crore was allocated for technical assistance projects and BDT 320.44 was reserved for special needs. A comparative allocation ratio of project assistance is cited in **Graph-8**.



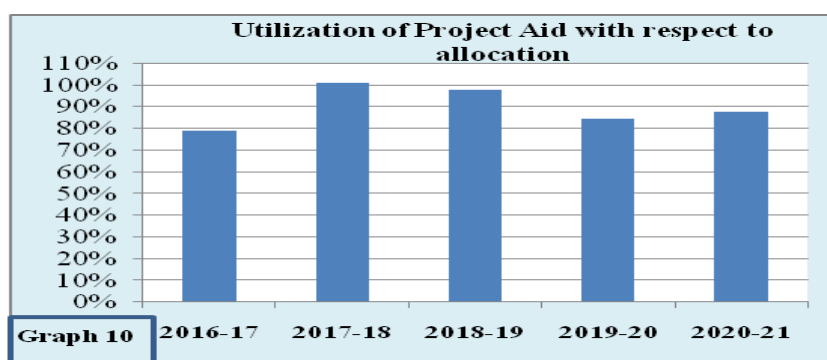
As in the last FYs, project assistance was allocated to 17 sectors in the FY 2020-21 where transport and power sectors received the highest allocation of foreign assistance. The information of top five sectors with the maximum allocation of foreign assistance in the revised ADP in FY 2020-21, is specified in **Graph-9**.



The allocation of sector-wise project assistance in the revised ADP for this FY is shown in **Annexure-5**. On the other hand, the Ministry of Science and Technology has received highest support from the Ministry/Division-wise allocation. **Annexure-6** contains the information of the Ministry/Division-wise allocation of FY 2020-21.

### Initiatives to increase the use of project support

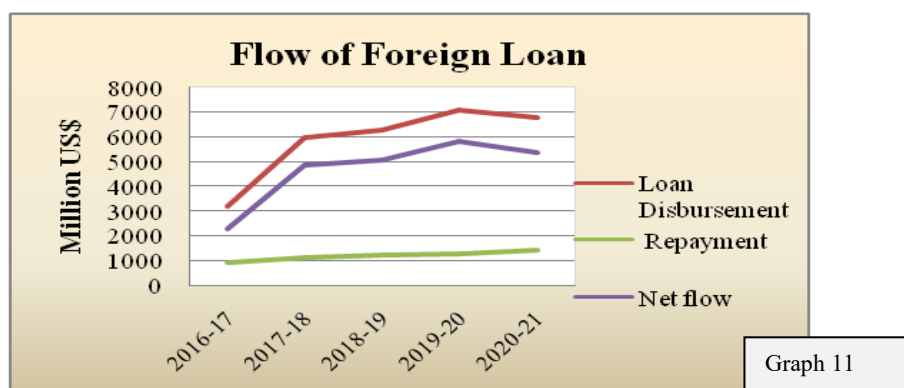
ERD has been continuously taking various initiatives to ensure maximum utilization of project assistance allocated to ADP projects. For the past few years, quarterly tripartite portfolio meetings, at the Wing-level, have been held with Ministries/Divisions and development partners. Slow moving projects are being identified in view of the pace of the disbursement of foreign assistance during the time period after the signing of the agreement. These projects are being reviewed at quarterly tripartite portfolio meetings. Moreover, there are biennial meetings at the Secretary-level and annual meetings at the Hon'ble Finance Minister's level to review the progress of the most allocated projects. Apart from these initiatives, the progress of the project implementation is monitored through a series of inspections for identifying the problems that may arise during implementation of the projects. All these initiatives taken by ERD plays a vital role towards increasing the utilization of project assistance allocated in favor of ADP-based projects. The information about the utilization of project assistance is presented in **Graph-10**.



A Fast Track Project Monitoring Committee was constituted under the Chairmanship of the Hon'ble Prime Minister on 15 May 2013 to accelerate the implementation of nationally important and major projects. After the formation of the committee, number of five meetings have been held till June 2021. Padma Multipurpose Bridge Project, 2X600 MW MOITRI Super Thermal Power (Rampal) Project, Ruppur Nuclear Power Plant Establishment Project, Dhaka Mass Rapid Transit Development (Metro Rail) Project, LNG Floating, Storage and Regasification Unit Construction Project, Paira Deep Sea Port Construction Project, Matarbari 2X600 MW Ultra Super Critical Coal Fired-Power Project, Padma Multipurpose Bridge Rail Link Project and Dohazari-Ramu Cox's Bazar & Ramu-Myanmar Ghundum Single Line Dual – gauge track construction project have been identified as nine fast track projects. A Fast track project monitoring task force has been set up to closely monitor the activities of these projects.

### External Debt Management

ERD manages foreign debt of the government. This Division has been using the internationally standardized software 'Debt Management Financial Analysis System' (DMFAS) for the last 12 years to facilitate the task of debt management. Bangladesh's ability to manage foreign debt has attained the global standard. Currently, most of the foreign borrowings taken by the government are medium and long-term loans, which are usually of a concessional nature. An analysis of the government's debt repayment data from a foreign source shows that the net flow of foreign debt has decreased by 7.80% in this FY as compared to the previous fiscal year as principal payment increased by 12.90%. **Graph-11** specifies the data of foreign debt flows of the past few years.



### 1.5.3 Debt Servicing

ERD manages foreign debt repayment activities. The Division has paid a total amount of USD 1914.81 million against foreign debts to the development partners in the FY 2020-21. Out Of these, the principal amount is USD 1418.63 million while interest is USD 496.18 million. In this FY, the budget allocation for foreign loan repayments was USD 2094.00 million. It should be noted that since independence, Bangladesh has been able to repay the loan in due time. Even Bangladesh never requires applying for re-scheduling of installments in repayment of loans.



### 1.5.4 Debt Sustainability

Several indicators are used globally to determine the sustainability of foreign debt. One of the most prevalent indicators is the foreign loan status and the comparative analysis of the country's GDP, export earnings, revenue income with the repayments of principals & interests. To this end, the World Bank and IMF have determined the risk borderline of debt sustainability indicators for the developing countries. A comparative picture of Bangladesh's foreign debt sustainability indicators for the FY 2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19 & 2019-20 are presented below:

The above index analysis specifies that the foreign debt sustainability of Bangladesh is far below the maximum risk limit. It reveals that Bangladesh's foreign debt sustainability is at a satisfactory level. This has also been reflected in the published observations of credit rating institutions such as Moody's Investors Service (Moody's), Standard and Poor's (S&P) and Fitch Ratings. These organizations have placed Bangladesh in the same sovereign debt index in their reports. In this rating list, Moody's, S&P and Fitch have also termed Bangladesh's credit situation stable by providing Ba3, BB- and BB- ratings respectively this year.

### Initiatives taken to reduce the risk of non-concessional loans

Additional investment demand has been created to achieve the target of establishing Bangladesh as an upper middle-income country by 2031. On the other hand, due to the slowdown in the global economy, the complexity of Europe-centric debt and the changing geopolitical context, the sources of flexible debt have shrunk.

In addition, as the state-owned enterprises and autonomous organizations are taking non-concessional loans against government guarantees, the risk of foreign debts is increasing steadily. The Standing Committee on Non-Concessional Loan

(SCNCL) was constituted with the chairmanship of the Hon'ble Finance Minister on 30 May 2013 to examine and approve the flexibility of the loan in a process consistent with the international best practice for mitigation of risk of hard conditions. Foreign loans with less than 25% grant element are required to be presented to this Ccommittee for examination and approval. This committee scrutinizes and approves the non-concessional loan proposals. SCNCL has approved the proposal for taking ten non-concessional loans in the FY 2020-21. It is mentionable that a total of 65 proposals for non-concessional loans have been approved till June 2021.

### 1.5.5 Policy and Procedural Reforms

Foreign Assistance Management System (FAMS) is a web-based application software developed for intensive monitoring and the accelerating the management of foreign assistance. Project implementing Ministries/Divisions/Agencies and Bangladesh Bank, CGA offices and every foreign assistance project are connected to this system online. Through this software, the overall management and reporting of foreign assistance, including the collection and usage of foreign assistance, monitoring of disbursements and formulation of ADPs, are being carried out. The running software is in the process of being connected to IBAS++, AIMS, including other systems developed by the Planning Division and IMED. A second phase of the project is underway to make the system more user-friendly and upgraded.

To expedite the implementation, ensure proper preparation and to carry out the preparatory work of the project within the stipulated time, the 'Allocation and Management Policy of the project preparatory work' and 'Checklist of the preparatory work of the project' have been formulated. It has already been published in the Gazette and sent to all Ministries/Divisions.

### Future Plans

Targets related to commitment and utilization of foreign assistance and debt repayment for the FY 2021-22;

1. The foreign assistance commitment target of USD 6,000.00 million has been estimated;
2. The foreign assistance disbursement target is estimated at USD 12893 million;
3. In the ADP, a total amount of BDT 88,024 crore has been allocated for the project assistance in favour of 341 (technical 125+ investment 216) foreign assistance projects; and
4. For the repayment of foreign loan and loan interest, a total of BDT 21037.50 crore has been allocated in the budget.

# CHAPTER 2

**AN OVERVIEW OF THE ACTIVITIES OF  
VARIOUS WINGS OF THE ECONOMIC  
RELATIONS DIVISION**

## 2.1. Wing-1: America and Japan

America and Japan Wing of ERD mobilizes all types of financial assistance including loan, grant and technical co-operation from Japan, USA and Canada. The Wing also coordinates all types of multilateral and bilateral economic cooperation activities with Japan, USA and Canada.

### 2.1.1. USA

The United States of America is a trusted development partner of Bangladesh since 1972. Under an umbrella Agreement titled “Economic Technical & Related Assistance”, which was signed in 1974, the USA is providing economic support to Bangladesh. USA has contributed more than 7 billion USD till today. USA provides most of its development assistance through United States Agency for International Development (USAID). United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and some other Government and non-Government organizations also provide financial and technical assistance to Bangladesh.

Government of Bangladesh and USAID signed ‘Development Objective Grant Agreement (DOAG)’ in 2012. After amendment no.34 of this agreement, the Grant increased by USD 189,823,000 and the total USAID contribution increased to USD 1,526,358,863.27. The ERD has taken initiative to sign a new DOAG with USAID. A draft agreement has been prepared and it is under negotiation process. Under the new agreement the USAID will increase its contribution to Bangladesh.

The USAID is mainly working in the area of health and nutrition, agriculture and food security, climate change, disaster management, democracy, human rights and education in Bangladesh. The USAID is continuously working to develop and modernize the agricultural sector of Bangladesh. USA is also working for the development of Child and Maternal Health and Improvement of Nutrition for them.

The USAID has extended support to Bangladesh in response to COVID-19 pandemic. The USAID has contributed 100 ventilators for different hospitals of Bangladesh for better treatment of COVID-19 patients. USAID also provided 870,000 KN95 masks, 52,000 Protective Goggles, 1000 Pulse Oximeters to combat the pandemic. The USAID also provided technical assistance and support to IEDCR for COVID-19 testing.

The USDA (U.S Department of Agriculture) is working continuously to develop the agricultural sector of Bangladesh. USDA is giving support for the diversification of agricultural products and mechanization of agriculture. In September 2020, USDA announced \$46.4 million USD as new funding for the development and assistance programs in Bangladesh; among which, USD 19 million has been allocated over three years for Education and Child Nutrition program and it will be implemented by the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP), and USD 27.4 million has been allocated over five years for a Food for Progress Program (FFP) and it will be implemented by the Land O’Lakes Venture 37 team. Both programs were created in partnership with the GoB to

modernize and strengthen the agriculture sector of Bangladesh, expand trade, reduce hunger and improve literacy and primary education.

### 2.1.2. Canada

Since 1972, Canada is providing financial and technical support to Bangladesh to achieve its development goals in diverse sector like education, healthcare, employment growth, promoting international trade and public financial management etc. The Canadian assistance is being channelized through the Global Affairs Canada in Bangladesh. The Global Affairs Canada provides assistance through different International Organizations, international and national N.G.Os.

### 2.1.3. Japan

The diplomatic relations between Bangladesh and Japan was established on 10<sup>th</sup> February 1972. The JICA Bangladesh office was established in 1973. Since Independence, Japan has contributed significantly to the overall development of Bangladesh. During 1972 to 2021, Japan has committed financial support of more than USD 27 billion as project assistance, food assistance, commodity assistance, technical assistance and budget support to Bangladesh in the form of loans and grants. Taking into account the commitment and disbursement amount of up to date, Japan is the largest bi-lateral Development Partner of Bangladesh. Japanese assistance to Bangladesh encompasses a wide range of cooperation in power and energy, transportation, telecommunication, agriculture, health, education, infrastructure, water and sanitation, environment, human resource development and in other sectors of economy.

In Japanese Fiscal Year 2020, which is April 2020 to March 2021, the Government of Japan committed to provide USD 3.93 billion as Yen loans to the Government of Bangladesh for project loans and budget support for Covid 19 countermeasures. In this Japanese FY, Bangladesh has become the largest recipient among 72 Japanese ODA recipient countries on a single year basis in the history of Japanese Yen loans. In this Japanese FY, total disbursement of 31 Japanese ODA financed projects was JPY 180.30 Billion (USD 1.64 billion), and thereby Bangladesh ranked second in terms of disbursement among all the Japanese ODA recipient countries.

There are 90 development projects ongoing under Japanese ODA loans, grants, technical assistance, JDCF, DRGA, DRGA-CF and JDS Fund. **Project List-Annexure-2.a (Page-147-160).**

In the FY 2020-21, Japan has committed USD 18.08 million as Grant and USD 2615 million as loan and total amount is USD 2633.08 million (**Detail Annexure 1). Project List-Annexure-1.a (Page-125-126).**

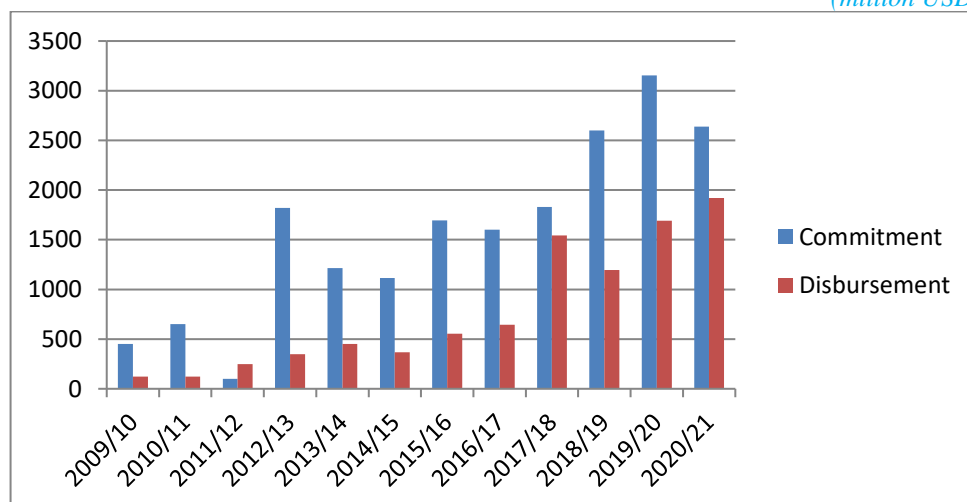

#### 2.1.4. Japan Human Resource Development Scholarship (JDS)

Japan Human Resource Development Scholarship (JDS) Project has been implemented by ERD since 2001 and it will be completed in 2025. Total estimated cost of the project is BDT 43108.05 lac in which GoB's contribution is BDT 528.25 lac and Japanese assistance is BDT 42579.80 lac. So far, Japan has provided JPY 6433.00 million as grant for this project. The main objective of the project is to provide opportunity for the Class-1 officials of Bangladesh Civil Service, Judicial Service and Bangladesh Bank to study Masters and Ph.D Courses in Japan to contribute to country's development by applying their knowledge on return.

Under this Programme, 355 officers successfully completed their Master's programme from renowned Japanese universities and returned to Bangladesh. A total of 66 officials of 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and Ph.D (57 for Masters and 9 for Ph.D) are presently studying in Japan. Selection is made through open competition among eligible officers. JDS fellows can pursue Master's and Ph.D Degree in the following areas under JDS Programme:

- Enhancement of Capacity for Public Administrative Government;
- Enhancement of Legal Capacity and Policy;
- Enhancement of Capacity for Urban and Rural Planning and Policy; and
- Enhancement of Capacity for Policy Planning of Public Finance, Investment Management and Economic Growth.

The Government of Japan also provides short term trainings for different Government officials. In FY 2020-2021, 90 officials were provided training through Japanese grants assistance.



## 2.2. Wing-2: World Bank

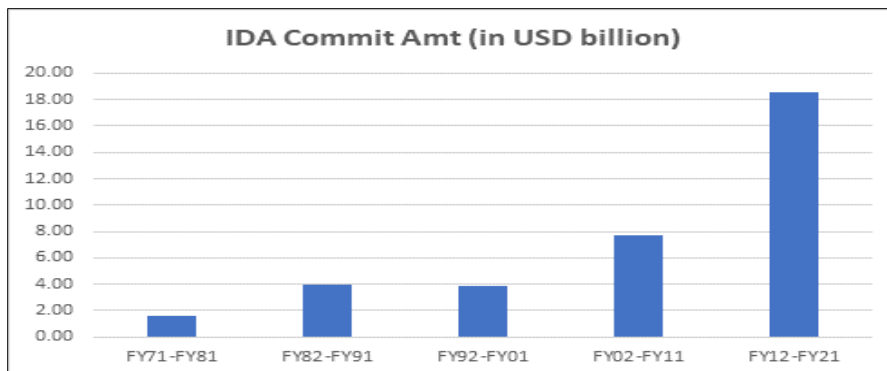
The World Bank Wing of the Economic Relations Division (ERD) manages and coordinates all the financial assistance/loan processing activities with the World Bank to ensure adequate funding for the important development projects of the Government of Bangladesh.

The World Bank was among the first development partners of Bangladesh and remained a committed partner all through the journey. In August 1972, Bangladesh became a member of the World Bank Group and in November 1972, the first World Bank project for Bangladesh, a USD 5 million Emergency Recovery Credit was approved. In ensuing years and decades, Bangladesh became the largest IDA-recipient country, with the World Bank as the country's largest external funder, providing more than a quarter of all foreign aid.

The World Bank's funding has been steadily increasing for the development projects in Bangladesh. Its support landscape covers foreign assistance economic and social development, institutional reforms, improving the public policy, infrastructure development, private sector development, energy sector development etc.

In line with the 8<sup>th</sup> Five Year Plan, the World Bank has been **preparing the 'Systematic Country Diagnostic (SCD)'** as an integral part of the new Country Partnership Framework (CPF) for Bangladesh. The current CPF expired in FY 2020-21. CPF involves in the area of (a) Energy Sector, (b) Inland Connectivity and Logistics, (c) Regional and Global Integration, (d) Urbanization and (e) Adaptive Delta Management.

The following chart shows the incremental increase of World Bank support in every decade for Bangladesh:



Since independence, the World Bank has committed more than USD 35.00 billion financing in grants, interest-free and concessional credits to address the country's development challenges. In the FY 22, the World Bank committed USD 3.9 billion new financing in 12 projects to help contain the impact of the pandemic and lay the groundwork for resilient recovery. At present, the World Bank portfolio stands at 47



ongoing projects with a total commitment of nearly USD 14.00 billion **Project List- Annexure-2.b (Page-161-166).**

In FY 2020-21 World Bank committed USD 214.80 million as grant and USD 2498.50 million as loan and total amount was USD 2713.30 million **Project List- Annexure-1.b (Page-127-129).**

## A Common Vision

Through a robust program of technical, analytical, and financial support, the World Bank Group is helping Bangladesh achieve its vision of upper-middle income status by the next decade. IFC, WBG's private sector arm, focuses on long term private sector development by providing financing to private companies and advisory services in strategic areas.

The World Bank Group's **Country Partnership Framework (CPF)** (2016-2020) for Bangladesh supports the country to achieve its growth aspirations. The framework has been extended to FY2021 and has been adjusted to respond to COVID-19.

Through a widely consultative process, the World Bank Group is embarking upon the preparation of the next **Country Partnership Framework (CPF)** for Bangladesh for 2023 to 2027, which will be anchored in the 8th Five-year Plan and the World Bank's **Systematic Country Diagnostic (SCD)**.

In addition, the World Bank has gradually been increasing its cooperation in conducting macro-economic stability and related cross-cutting challenges; human development, institutions and business environment for sustainable development.

## Results: Shared Vision for Prosperity

Under the current CPF, the World Bank's support focuses on economic development and growth, power, infrastructure, disaster management, climate change, human and social development, and poverty reduction. Here is an example of the impacts created through nearly five decades of partnership.

The World Bank has been currently financing in Bangladesh from its IDA resources in the **Human Resource Development (HRD), Energy, Climate Change and Disaster**

**Preparedness and Digitalization in the Public Procurement sectors along with combating the COVID-19 and helping the Forcefully Displaced Myanmar Nationals (Rohingya population) (FDMNs).**

**Education:** The IDA is the largest external funder in Bangladesh's education sector covering the primary, secondary, and tertiary education, as well as vocational training and education for the hard to reach children.

**Health:** The World Bank supports the government's fourth HNP sector program, strengthening health system governance and management capacities, and delivery of essential services, with a focus on the lagging regions of Sylhet, Chittagong, and Barishal Divisions.

**Electricity:** The World Bank support has added over 2,652 MW of electricity, including 181 MW through renewable energy sources. Another 310 MW capacity will be added to the national grid through ongoing grid-tied solar projects. With USD 1.83 billion ongoing programs in the energy sector, the World Bank support covers generation, transmission, and distribution of power, including from renewable energy sources.

**Climate Change and disaster preparedness:** The World Bank has an ongoing portfolio of USD 1.3 billion supporting Bangladesh to build resilience against natural disasters. The World Bank helped the country build and rehabilitate more than 1,000 cyclone shelters that also serve as primary schools, and repair 700 kilometers of coastal embankment.

**Digitalization of the public procurement system:** The World Bank helped the government to digitize its public procurement system. In FY20, 62% of public procurement expenditure in the country, or USD 17.5 billion of procurement contracts, was processed digitally.

**Rohingya Influx:** To help the country deal with the influx of the Forcefully Displaced Myanmar Nationals (Rohingya population) (FDMNs) until their safe and voluntary return to Myanmar, the World Bank has committed USD 590.00 million in grant financing. Through 6 ongoing projects, the World Bank supports the government to respond to the health, education, basic service delivery, and safety net needs of the Rohingya and the host community.

**Initiatives taken in FY2020-21 for facilitating the Covid-19 Pandemic Preparedness**

## 1. Signed Loan Projects:

### **Covid-19: Emergency Response and Pandemic Preparedness (ERPP) Project (Additional Financing)/ (2nd Loan)**

The World Bank approved USD 100.00 million to help the country to test, treat, manage the COVID-19 infection, as well as strengthen the public health system. The financing helped ramp up COVID-19 testing and strengthen treatment through ensuring supplies of critical items like ventilators, oxygen concentrators, ICU beds, high flow oxygen cannula, and personal protective equipment. Since then, the World Bank has committed \$ 1.7 billion more for Bangladesh to help create quality jobs, improve water and sanitation services, and accelerate economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic as well as build resilience to future crises.

In April, 2021, the GoB signed a Financing Agreement with the World Bank of an additional USD 500.00 million to support the government's vaccination program under the '**COVID-19: Emergency Response and Pandemic Preparedness (ERPP) Project**' is being implemented by the Health Services Division (HSD) of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

Previously, the 1<sup>st</sup> Loan Agreement of USD 100.00 million was signed with WB on 10 April 2020. Moreover, AIIB has financed into the project as a co-financer with WB with an amount of USD100.00 million that was signed on 19 February 2021.

**Project Actions/Facilities:** Health Department under Health Service Division is implementing the project. The project actions are aiming to improve the capabilities in the areas of surveillance, case investigation and deployment of rapid response teams for 'Covid-19' cases and/or suspected cases. In order to facilitate the project, Covid-19 vaccine would be purchased under the 2nd (Additional) Loan of USD500.00 million signed with WB.

## 2. Resilience, Entrepreneurship and Livelihood Improvement (RELI) Project

**Loan Agreement with DPs:** A Loan Agreement of USD 300.00 million is signed with WB on 27/06/2021. **Project Actions/Facilities:** Social Development Foundation (SDF) under the Financial Institutions Division (FID) has been implementing the project.

The Project is aiming to

- create resilience to support youth entrepreneurs affected by Climate Change or different kind of shocks including the Covid-19 Epidemic;
- assist in overcoming poverty by creating income-generating activities, increasing skills and creating employment opportunities for rural poor families; and
- creating entrepreneurs in rural areas for post Covid-19 economic recovery.



Financing Agreement amounting to USD 300.00 million for 'RELI Project' was signed on 27.06.2021 between Economic Relations Division (ERD) and World Bank. Ms. Fatima Yasmin, Secretary, ERD, Ministry of Finance and Ms. Mercy Miyang Tembon, Country Director, World Bank, Dhaka Office (not present in the picture) signed the loan agreement respectively.

## COVID-19 linked Pipeline Project for the FY 2022

### Local Government COVID-19 Response & Recovery Project

**Dealing with DP:** In response to ERD's financing request, The WB has included this project in the FF21/FY22 lending program. A virtual Appraisal Mission appraised the project during 29 March-08 April, 2021 where ERD along with the Local Government Division (LGD) summarized key discussion regarding the project implementation and loan financing. The Financing Agreement in favor of the project is expected to be signed in this FY: 2021-22.

**Project's Expected Facilities:** Local Government Division (LGD) is supposed to implement the project, which is expected to

- ensure the health service distribution among the mass-people to prevent Covid-19 infection;
- ensure the availability of essential and preventive health service for the Covid-19 affected families;
- emphasize on emergency health service of General Public Health;
- emphasize on Public Service, infrastructure and other facilities (water supply, waste management, Sanitation, Drainage etc.)

The World Bank is currently the single largest multi-lateral development partner of Bangladesh.

### **2.3. Wing-3: Administration and Middle East**

This wing comprises of two branches, namely- Administration Branch and Middle East Branch. The Administration Branch plays the key-role of internal control and management of ERD; whereas the Middle East Branch mobilizes loan and grants from the external sources and manages activities related to Joint Economic Commission/Joint Commission /Joint Committee/Joint Economic and Technical Cooperation.

#### **2.3.1. Activities of Administration Branch**

- Budget Preparation
- Preparation and approval of pay, allowances and bills of ERD personnel's
- Nominating officers for local and foreign training.
- Activities related to recruitment, promotion, posting, pension etc.
- Providing general services, logistics and procurement activities
- Resolving audit objections
- Organizing in-house/ internal training
- Celebration of national and international days/ events.
- Payment of subscription in favor of Bangladesh Government to the international organizations.
- Activities related to appointment & deputation in foreign economic wings.
- Supervising the performance of the economic wings
- Miscellaneous

#### **2.3.2. Significant Activities of Administration Branch in FY 2020-21**

Abiding by 31 point direction of HPM health protocols are strictly ensured. Covid-19 safety items (masks, sanitizer etc) has given regularly among 353 employees of ERD. No mask No entry and NO mask No service strictly followed. Celebrating the birth centenary of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, ERD campus ornamented with banners and festoons and a seminar was arranged with all ERD officials. The golden Jubilee of independence of Bangladesh was also observed in befitting manner. The NEC 2 conference room has renovated nicely. Training has given all officers and staffs about office management and relevant issues using e - platform. To keep the environment clean and prevent dengue, cleaning activities of office premises are conducted and monitored regularly.

#### **2.3.3. Remarkable Activities of Economic Wings Abroad in FY 2020-21**

There are 9 economic wings operating abroad under the administration of ERD, viz. Washington D.C., and Permanent Mission to United Nations, Tokyo, Brussels, Rome, Riyadh, Bangkok, Beijing, and New Delhi. The Primary functions of the wings are

- Fostering and strengthening economic relations;
- Foreign resource mobilization;
- Vertical and horizontal expansion of development cooperation;

- Cementing relations among investors of host and recipient country;
- Maintaining relations among Finance and Commerce Ministries of both countries;
- Updating/suggesting changes and challenges in the hasty changing world economy etc.

#### **2.3.4.1 Economic Wing, New York**

Bangladesh has been re-elected to the Executive Board of UNICEF and the Executive Board of UN-Women for another term commencing from January 2022.

#### **2.3.4.2 Economic Wing, Washington D.C.**

Prime Minister's Office (PMO) and Bangladesh Working Group of U.S. Chamber of Commerce (UCC) jointly organized a dialogue through the virtual platform on 26 August 2020 promoting 'Digital Financial Services, Commerce and Payments in Bangladesh. Hon'ble ICT Affairs Adviser to the HPM Mr. Sajeeb Ahmed Wazed briefed government's plan for promoting Bangladesh as a digital nation.

In September 2020, a dialogue was organized by the Embassy of Bangladesh with the cooperation of Bangladesh Working Group of U.S. Chamber of Commerce with the U.S. energy sectors leader. Hon'ble State Minister for Power, Energy and Mineral Resources Mr. Nasrul Hamid, MP explained Bangladesh's position.

A significant event took place on 30 September 2020 titled 'Vision of Advancing the U.S.-Bangladesh Economic Partnership Dialogue' by the government of Bangladesh and the U.S. Department of State. Both sides stressed on strong bilateral cooperation overcoming the current severe economic disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and vow to work together advancing the 'U.S.-Bangladesh Economic Partnership' into a new height.

#### **2.3.4.3 Economic Wing, Tokyo**

Economic Wing of Embassy of Japan arranged a number of meetings with JICA HQ, Ministry of Foreign Affairs and JICE to facilitate JICA financed ODA, Grants, Technical Assistance and JDS programs in Bangladesh.

#### **2.3.4.4 Economic Wing, Riyadh**

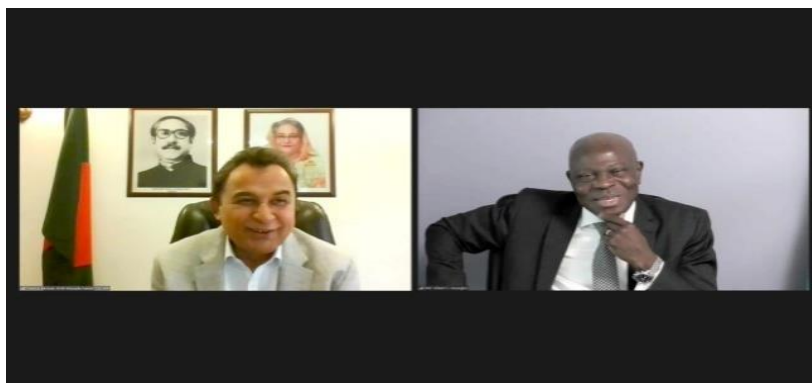
Amid Covid 19 situation, Economic wing Riyadh carried out various program using virtual means. Efforts were made to keep the communication alive regarding the initiatives taken before the pandemic in previous years. These actions were taken to maintain and enhance economic relations with Bangladesh and Saudi Arabia.

#### **2.3.4.5 Economic Wing, Rome**

Bangladesh will host the 36<sup>th</sup> Session of the FAO Regional Conference for Asia and the Pacific Region (APRC) in Dhaka in March 2022.

Hon'ble Finance Minister of Bangladesh, Mr. A H M Mustafa Kamal, FCA, MP, attended a meeting (on virtual platform) with Mr. Gilbert F. Houngbo, President of the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) on 16 February 2021 on the occasion of the 44<sup>th</sup> session of the IFAD Governing Council that was held on 17-18 February 2021.

Bangladesh once again nominated as the Alternate Member of IFAD EB for 2021. Bangladesh Embassy organized Entrepreneurship Training for Non-Resident Bangladeshis (NRBs) in Italy on a virtual platform as a part of celebratory activities to mark 100<sup>th</sup> Birth Anniversary of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman (Mujib Borsho). The training sessions were conducted by resource persons from Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Commerce and Bangladesh Investment Development Authority (BIDA).

Economic Wing, Rome working on to establish Sheikh Mujib-Bangladesh Room at FAO Headquarters, Rome. Furthermore, Rome Mission is coordinating with the Government of Bangladesh and Ministry of Economic Development, Italy, to sign an **Intergovernmental Agreement on Cooperation in the field of Energy** between Petrobangla in Bangladesh and Eni, a fully integrated global oil and gas company, to explore the possibilities to supply long-term LNG.

#### 2.3.4.6. Economic Wing, Bangkok

The 77<sup>th</sup> Commission Session of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) was held on virtual platform second year in a row on 26 April, 2021. Hon'ble Prime Minister H.E. Sheikh Hasina participated and delivered a video message in the leaders' segment where she made a 4-point recommendation to the ESCAP as way forward to address COVID-19 pandemic and to build back better Asia Pacific. Hon'ble Finance Minister A H M Mustafa Kamal also spoke as a Panelist on Special Body on Least Developed, Landlocked Developing and Pacific Island Developing Countries. An 11-member Bangladesh delegation led by the Secretary Economic Relations Division (ERD) participated and contributed to the session through projecting Bangladesh's positions in different agenda items and Commission's outcome. Secretary of ERD, Ms. Fatima Yasmin presented the country



statement of Bangladesh centering the overarching theme “Building back better from crises through regional cooperation in Asia and the Pacific”.

The Government of Bangladesh, in cooperation from UNESCAP, UNOHRRLLS, WTO and OECD Development Centre arranged a strategic dialogue on the sidelines of the 77th Session of UNESCAP titled as “Sustainable Graduation in the Challenging Time: Perspectives from Bangladesh and the Region”.

Second successful side Event on margin of the Commission titled as “Moving Past Coal in the Asia-Pacific Region” jointly sponsored by the Govt. of Bangladesh and UNESCAP, was held as part of ESCAP’s 77th Commission Session.

#### **2.3.4.7 Economic Wing, New Delhi**

Regular interactions and intimate relations have been maintaining with the counterpart of Ministry of External Affairs of India, and in particular with the Development Partnership Administration Division (DPA-I) and Export-Import Bank of India. India has extended 3 Lines of Credit (LoC) to Bangladesh of USD 7.362 billion (without defense credit). So far 48 projects have been undertaken and USD 686.08 has been disbursed to the projects. 15 LoC project review meetings were held in the FY 2020-21. Economic Wing, New Delhi attend 1st High Level LoC Project Monitoring Committee Meeting, coordinate bi-lateral Lines of Credit review meeting and Joint Economic Commission between Bangladesh and India, liaison with BIDA and BEZA to facilitate Indian entrepreneurs and potential investors to invest in Bangladesh;

#### **2.3.4.8. Economic Wing, Beijing**

During the financial year 2020-21, there were 10 China aided on-going projects and among then 9 were financed in USD amounting to USD 7091.51 another project was financed in Chinese Renminbi (Chinese Yuan) and the amount was Yuan 500.00 million. Loan agreement for one project is very close to be signed and the amount is USD 1155.18 million.

13 on-going projects (amount USD 2389.00) are financed by AIIB during the financial year 2020-2021. It is to be mentioned here that out of this USD 2389.00 million, AIIB provided USD 650.00 million for emergency COVID-19 supports.

A total number of 5 loan agreements were signed with AIIB and the total loan amount is USD 1174.00 million and loan agreement for one project will be signed shortly worth of USD 260.00 million. AIIB will also provide USD 500.00 million for purchasing vaccines for COVID-19.

#### **2.3.4.9. Economic Wing, Brussels**

European Union (EU) transferred EUR 42 million (BDT 423 crore) to the Government of Bangladesh to support key national reforms in the education sector.

On 30 June 2021, the EU and Germany transferred EUR 33 million (around BDT 330 Crore) to the Government of Bangladesh to strengthen key areas of its social security system and build resilience to Covid-19, with a particular focus on affected workers in export-oriented industries.

The European Union (EU) and Germany signed an agreement on 10 December 2020 to provide EUR 113 million (nearly BDT 1,145 crore) in support to the Government's "Social Protection Program for Unemployed and Distressed Workers in the RMG, Leather goods and Footwear Industries." This program, which is part of Team Europe's contribution to fight Covid-19 and its consequences in Bangladesh, offers a safety net to workers whose livelihoods are affected by the economic fallout.

On 02 July 2020, the European Union commits € 32 million (BDT 304 Crore) responding to the needs of Bangladeshi Host Communities and Rohingyas in Cox's Bazar.

The European Commission announced on 23 February 2021 that EU allocates €39 million in humanitarian aid to address the needs of displaced and conflict-affected communities in Bangladesh and Myanmar, in particular in the context of the pressing Rohingya refugee crisis, which has been worsened by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The European Union informed through a press release on 08 April 2021 that the EU is providing an additional €150,000 (close to 15 million Bangladeshi taka) to step up its support for Rohingya refugees affected by the massive fire that swept through refugee camps in the Bangladeshi southern district of Cox's Bazar.

Total number of Erasmus Mundus Scholarships has been offered for Bangladesh is 139 for the academic year 2021-22.

### 2.3.5 Activities of Middle East Branch

- Mobilizing Loan and Grants from the External Sources

The Middle East Branch processes, coordinates and reviews the mobilizing of external resources (loans and grants) for the implementation of public sector development projects in Bangladesh from the following countries and development partners of the Middle East Region and the Africa Continent:

#### 2.3.6. Significant activities conducted by Middle East Branch in FY 2020-21

- Hon'ble Secretary, Economic Relations Division acted as Executive Director of the Board of Executive Directors (BED) of Islamic Development Bank for the year 2020. Hon'ble Secretary participated in all four meeting of Board of Executive Directors and effectively contributed.
- Hon'ble Secretary, Economic Relations Division and all concerns of Bangladesh side negotiated successfully with ITFC for financial support for Importation of Petroleum products. After successful negotiation ITFC has agreed to finance USD 400 m with a contingency of USD 200 m, total USD 600 m for Petroleum products under BPC Financial Plan-2021.

#### 2.3.7. Achievement of Middle East Branch in FY 2020-21

The Middle East Branch achieved 100% target of commitment and 111.37% of disbursement during FY 2020-2021 and signed 5 loan agreements during the same time.

## 2.4. Wing-4: United Nations

The UN Agencies have been playing vital role in the socio-economic development of Bangladesh since long. A total of 14 resident and 8 non-resident agencies of the United Nations are working in Bangladesh. The Office of the United Nations Resident Coordinator (UNRCO) is the coordinating entity of all UN agencies working in Bangladesh. The UN agencies are providing technical and financial support to promote socio-economic development aligning the areas of UN cooperation with the development strategies of Bangladesh. The UN system provides development assistance through the apex framework agreement named as United Nations Development Assistance Framework (UNDAF).

The existing UNDAF will continue up to December 2021. The new United Nations Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework (UNSDCF) has been approved for the period 2022 to 2026. The respective agencies also formulate country programmes aligned with the Five Year Plan to provide support to specific areas. Country Programme Document (CPD) of UNDP, UNICEF and UNFPA have been finalized for the period 2022-2026. The resident agencies in Bangladesh are: FAO, IFAD, ILO, IOM, UNDP, UNESCO, UNFPA, UNHCR, UNICEF, UNIDO, UNOPS, UN Women, WHO & WFP and the non-resident agencies are: ITU, UNAIDS, UNCDF, UNCTAD, UN HABITAT, UNHRC, UNODC & UNV.

The development cooperation related to some innovative financing as well as climate financing is also done through UN Wing. The GCF, GEF and the Global Fund are prominent among them. For GCF financing, the ERD acts as the National Designated Authority. There are 85 ongoing projects with the support of different UN agencies. **Project List-Annexure-1.d (Page-131-135)**. A total of 28 Grant Agreements have been signed in FY 2020-2021 **Project List-Annexure-2.d (Page-171-184)**.



### **2.4.1 United Nations Development Programme:**

United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) has partnered with Bangladesh ever since its birth and through its remarkable journey from a war-ravaged economy to a lower middle income and “medium human development” country. It remains a catalyst in Bangladesh’s journey towards graduating to an upper middle-income country and attending the sustainable development goals (SDGs) by 2030. UNDP assists in building institutions and helps to strengthen institutional capacities through people-centric, pro-poor, inclusive and sustainable policy making and development governance.

It focuses on unleashing Bangladesh’s vast development potential and boosting resilience, expanding opportunities and strengthening livelihoods of the poor and vulnerable. Simultaneously, it assists in addressing the country’s development challenges in the areas of peace and security, natural disasters and climate change risks, governance, and humanitarian emergencies. At present 12 projects are going on with a total of US\$ 425.63 million focusing knowledge for development, inclusive development in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, social security policy support, local government initiatives in climate change, livelihoods improvements of urban poor, and Integrated National Financing Framework for Accelerating Achievement of SDGs (INFF4SDGs) in Bangladesh.

### **National Human Development Report (NHDR):**

Human development is the centre of all developments to take a country to its desired level. Keeping this notion at the centre of all the dimensions of development, the Economic Relations Division has taken initiatives to publish the National Human Development Report on the eve of the 50th anniversary of the Independence of Bangladesh. The report will highlight five thematic areas such as Human Development, Climate Change, Employment for the Youth, Teenagers’ Dream for the Future Bangladesh, and Peace and Prosperities. The NHDR will be significantly useful to the policy makers, planners, academia, researchers, community workers, and the global community.

### **2.4.2 Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO)**

The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) is a specialized agency of the United Nations. FAO's mandate is to build a world without hunger through technical cooperation and assistance to the member states. It was established in 1945 and has 194 member states. Bangladesh became the member of FAO on 12 November 1973 and the FAO Representative Office in the country was established in 1978. Right from the beginning, FAO has been providing support to the government to transform the agriculture sector and ensure food and nutrition security for all. This has largely been the way of technical collaboration across multiple sectors, viz. agriculture, fisheries, livestock, food safety, food and nutrition security (FNS), environment and climate



change, forestry, rural development, sustainable livelihoods, and more recently urban food systems.

Over the last 45 years, FAO has provided support to more than 330 projects amounting to grant value of USD 312.5 million. As on date, nineteen projects are operational. FAO is providing technical and financial support on the basis of Country Programming Framework 2019-20 extended up to 2021. The priority areas are- (i) Healthy, safe, and nutritious food, (ii) Sustainability of productive ecosystems and (iii) Resilient and inclusive agro-economic growth.

Nine Agreements has been signed during Financial Year 2020-2021 for total grant amount USD 4.36 million.

#### **2.4.3 United Nations Children’s Fund (UNICEF):**

GOB-UNICEF Country Programme (CP) Document 2017-2020 was inked on 11 March 2018 regarding overall development of all Bangladeshi children and women. The Country Programme Document during the period 2017-2020 has started its implementation since 01 January 2017. The current CPD will continue up to 31 December 2021. In this Country Programme, following are the areas of cooperation that are provided by UNICEF:

- Young children and their mothers;
- Primary school going girls and boys;

- Change in adolescents;
- Creating awareness in children rights;
- Gender equity;

A total grant of USD 340.00 million was committed by UNICEF in the Country Programme Document (CPD) 2017-2020. Total 32 Projects/Programmes were implemented by 16 ministries and organizations. The new CPD for 2022-2026 is going to be finalized by ERD and UNICEF in cooperation with relevant Ministries/Divisions as well as agencies. The CPD has been prepared aligning with 8<sup>th</sup> FY Plan and SDG Goals. In the new CPD, the commitment is USD 306.00 (Three Hundred and Six) million as Grant. Among this grant, USD 86.00 million is from regular source and 220.00 million is from other sources. The CPD will mainly focus on the challenges of gender equity, prevention of early child marriage, climate change, urbanization, disability as well as assistance in introducing an overall system to meet the various needs of the children at different stages of life.

#### **2.4.4 United Nation Population Fund (UNFPA):**

UNFPA is the lead UN agency for delivering a world where every pregnancy is wanted, every child-birth is safe and every young person's potential is fulfilled. Ever since its founding, UNFPA has worked to build a world, where every person has access to sexual and reproductive health services and where no one is deprived of their zeros (zero unmet need for family planning, zero preventable maternal deaths, and zero violence and harmful practices against women and girls, including zero child marriage) around the world by 2030.

UNFPA has been working in partnership with the Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh since 1974, providing technical and advisory services and support. UNFPA works in partnership with the Government ministries, the Parliament, Un Agencies, academic Institutions and civil society organisation. Under the UNFPA Ninth Country programme 2017-21, with a fund of USD 43 million has been implementing 15 projects at 14 Ministries/Departments to address four areas of development: i) sexual and reproductive health and rights; ii) adolescent and youth; iii) equality and women's empowerment and iv) population dynamics.

#### **2.4.5 United Nations Capital Development Fund (UNCDF):**

In Bangladesh, UNCDF has been working since 1976. Initially, UNCDF supported rural small-scale infrastructures in agriculture, rural development, health, food security, water supply, fishery, livelihood and small and cottage industries.

Since the year 2000, UNCDF provided \$62 million as grant, technical assistance and operational support to Bangladesh through various projects. Presently, UNCDF in partnership with the Bangladesh Bank and Financial Institution Division has been

implementing the project Shaping Inclusive Finance Transformations (SHIFT) in Bangladesh from February 2016 - 31 July 2023 with a fund of about US\$ 8.2 million. In alignment with the Seventh Five Year Plan 2016-2020 of the GoB, SHIFT in Bangladesh is working for accelerating uptake and usage of digital financial services to expand financial inclusion through digital pathways. More than 10,000 Micro Merchants, Women, Business Development Service providers, local association leaders are trained on digital financial services (DFS), enterprise management and digital business platforms.

#### **2.4.6 UN Women:**

UN Women has been working to address discriminations against women and to ensure gender parity. In partnership with the government, UN WOMEN is implementing Strengthening Gender Responsive Budgeting in Bangladesh with a fund of 4.52 crore taka (USD 66.602 million). The aim of the project is to strengthen the institutional capacity of the gender responsive budgeting to bring positive changes in women empowerment and gender parity. The project has been implemented by the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs.

#### **2.4.7 International Maritime Organization (IMO):**

The International Maritime Organization is the United Nations specialized agency with responsibility for the safety and security of shipping and the prevention of marine and atmospheric pollution by ships.

Bangladesh is one of the key countries in global ship recycling having a market share of about 30 percent (in terms of light displacement tonnage) and dismantles about 200 end of life ships per year. The Bangladesh ship recycling industry produces about 2.5 million tonnage of scrap steel annually that fulfils 60%-70% of country's raw iron demand. This industry generates 35-40 thousand fulltime equivalent jobs and supports many national and local economic activities. Considering its immense importance, the Government of Bangladesh declared the ship recycling activities as 'industry' in 2011. Since then the Ministry of Industries has been relentlessly working for the improvement the environmental and occupational health & safety standards of this industry. 'Safe and Environmentally Sound Ship Recycling in Bangladesh - Phase III (November 2020-April 2022) project is the joint effort of Ministry of Industries and IMO to enhance national capacities for safe and environmentally sound recycling of ships in Bangladesh.

#### **2.4.8 International Labor Organization (ILO):**

Since the establishment of the International Labor Organization (ILO), it has been providing financial and technical assistance to implement various development plans, including creating a working environment based on the consensus of all, bringing the government, owners and labor parties under the same platform. Since 1972

Bangladesh accepted the active membership of the International Labor Organization (ILO). In Bangladesh, ILO started its income generation activities primarily through the development and maintenance of labor-based infrastructure and expanded its operation later on. During the financial year 2020-21, two projects of ILO have been processed.

#### **2.4.9 International Organization of Migration (IOM):**

The international organization of Migration (IOM), since its establishment, is the leading international migration agency and is dedicated to the development of Human and Orderly Migration. The agency has been working closely with various government, inter-governmental agencies / NGOs and non-governmental organizations to ensure safe migration. One of IOM's tasks is to develop international cooperation in resolving immigration issues, seeking solutions to immigration problems and providing humanitarian assistance to refugees and internally displaced people.

IOM has identified four priority areas to work in Bangladesh and continues to work with government agencies and other non-governmental organizations. Priority areas are:

1. Migration management;
2. Resilience and social protection;
3. Humanitarian response and
4. Countering irregular migration

#### **2.4.10 The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO):**

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) were established on November 9, 1965 as a specialized agency of the United Nations. Bangladesh became its member on 27 October, 1972. UNESCO's scope of work has been widening in Bangladesh since its establishment of country office in Bangladesh in 1996.

The agency is providing financial and technical support for the development of education, culture, science and technology development and utilization of the technology. At the same time, it has undertaken various development projects in the sector of poverty alleviation, protection of the environment, development of use of information technology etc.

#### **2.4.11 The United Nations Environment Program (UNEP):**

The United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) was established in 1972. It has been providing financial and technical assistance to developing countries in formulation and implementation of environment friendly policies. There is no

permanent office of UNEP in Bangladesh. The agency is continuing its operations in Bangladesh from its permanent office (Nairobi, Kenya) and regional offices. No project with UNEP was signed in the fiscal year 2020-21.

#### **2.4.12 The United Nations Volunteers (UNV)**

The United Nations Volunteers (UNV) programme contributes to peace and development through volunteerism worldwide. The agency works with partners to integrate qualified, highly motivated and well supported UN Volunteers into development programming and promote the value and global recognition of volunteerism.

Economic Relations Division has signed an MOU with UNV Asia and Pacific Regional in 2018 for Govt-sponsored Fully Funded IUNV Programme. The volunteers' potential activities in the context of SDGs are to raise awareness about 2030 agenda, to deliver technical expertise, to mobilise people, to develop skills across different SDG goals area, to collect data and to provide technical support and enhance capacity in all thematic goal areas.

The Government of Bangladesh has formulated the draft National Volunteer Policy to promote volunteerism with the support of UNV.

#### **2.4.13 The Global Fund:**

The Global Fund (GF) is an innovative multi-stakeholder financing institution that provides major funding to national disease programs for HIV and AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria. The Global Fund disbursed grants in Bangladesh more than USD 569 million till June 2021. Bangladesh Country Coordinating Mechanism (BCCM) and its secretariat coordinate all the GF programmes in Bangladesh. The BCCM is headed by Hon'ble Minister, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

Five Agreements have been signed in Financial Year 2020-2021 for the period 2021-2023 for total grant amount USD 90.33 million.

#### **2.4.14 The Vital Strategies (The Union):**

The Vital Strategies is a global public health organization provides grant facility to make the tobacco free world. One Agreement has been signed in Financial Year 2020-2021 for grant amount USD 0.192 million.

#### **2.4.15 Green Climate Fund (GCF):**

Climate change is a major impediment to realize our vision to become a developed country by 2041 since Bangladesh is one of the most vulnerable countries to its adverse effects. According to the Climate Risk Index 2020, Bangladesh is ranked 7

amongst the worst victims of climate change. The government under the leadership of Hon'ble Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina rightly gave all-out efforts to address the social and economic risks associated with such disasters. Bangladesh is a global leader in disaster management and locally-led adaptation and mitigation measures. She is hosting the South Asia Regional Office of Global Center on Adaptation. Every year Bangladesh has to spend nearly USD 5 billion, around 2.5 percent of our GDP, on climate change adaptation and resilience building.

In a bid to raise green coverage, around 30 million saplings have been planted across the country this year marking the birth centenary of our Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. Bangladesh also prepared '**Bangladesh Delta Plan 2100**' with the vision of achieving safe, climate resilient and prosperous Bangladesh. Moreover, she is one of the founding donors of the new CVF and V20 Joint Multi-Donor Fund under the United Nations.

Economic Relations Division (ERD) tries to ensure development assistance for both climate adaptation and mitigation. The Secretary of ERD acts as the National Designated Authority (NDA) of the Green Climate Fund (GCF) formed under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) to help the least developed countries and small islands in implementing climate adaptation and mitigation solutions.

As of now, two national entities from Bangladesh namely Infrastructure Development Company Limited (IDCOL) and Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) got accreditation of GCF as Direct Access Entities (DAEs).

So far, GCF and other development partners are funding 05 (five) projects worth 389.76 million USD of which assistance as grant for the adaptation is USD 119.76 million while assistance for mitigation related projects is USD 270 million. Apart from GCF, Bangladesh is also a member of the South-Asia Constituency of Global Environment Facility (GEF). Currently GEF allocated USD 128.70 million in 6 different projects.

#### **2.4.16 Contribution of Bangladesh to UN agencies**

Bangladesh has become a member of UN in 1974 and the country has been contributing to different UN agencies to support their programmes and activities since then. The contribution to the eight agencies, viz. UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNODC, UNOSSC, UN- WOMEN and UNV is about USD 6,49,060 in 2000.

#### **2.4.17 South-South Cooperation (SSC):**

Following the current global trend of declining conventional foreign aid, a strong and promising form of cooperation called South-South Cooperation (SSC) is rapidly gaining global recognition and institutionalization among the under-developed and developing countries of the South. South-South Cooperation is a very important platform for a developing country like Bangladesh in the changing world situation. Bangladesh from the very beginning has been playing an important role in the platform. The Hon'ble Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has already been awarded with the South-South Leadership Award 2013 and the South-South Visionary Award 2014 for her visionary leadership in SSC. Bangladesh also received the UN South-South Cooperation Award in recognition of its significant contribution to South-South Cooperation.

To take Bangladesh forward in SSC network, a South-South Cooperation Cell (SSC Cell) has already been set up in ERD. A Task-Force has been constituted under the chairmanship of the Secretary, Economic Relations Division to expedite the process of setting up the Center as well as to further strengthen the position of Bangladesh in the South-South Cooperation Network.

#### **2.4.18 Non-Resident Bangladeshis (NRB) Activities:**

A NRB Cell has been established in ERD to facilitate Non-resident Bangladeshis-NRBs. The Convention of Non-resident Bangladesh Engineers (CONE) was held in 26-27 February 2019 in order to engage Non-resident Bangladeshis in the national development.



## 2.5. Wing-5: Asian Development Bank (ADB)

ADB wing of the Economic Relations Division (ERD) is involved in mobilizing external resources, i.e. loans, grants and technical assistance from the Asian Development Bank (ADB) to achieving a prosperous, inclusive, resilient and sustainable socio-economic development of Bangladesh. It also provides nominations for representing the Government of Bangladesh in training, workshop and meeting held in home and abroad conducted by ADB. ADB is the second largest development partner of Bangladesh. Bangladesh became member of ADB in 1973. Since 1973, ADB has been continuously supporting Bangladesh to achieve development milestones.

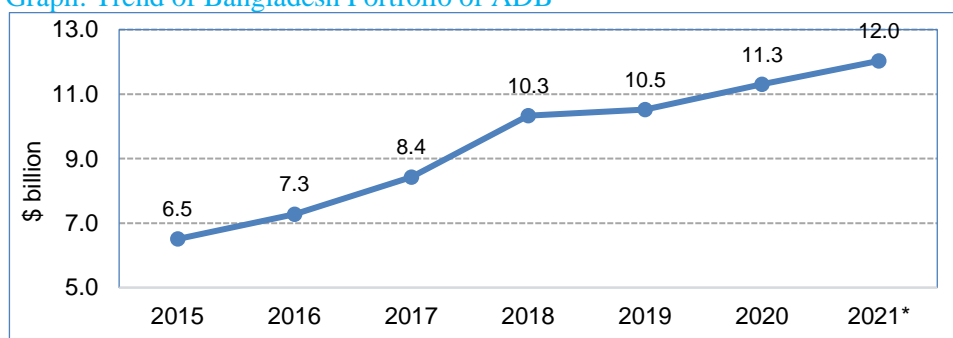
ADB provides loans, technical assistance and grants in Bangladesh to promote social and economic development. ADB has provided a total of USD 1655.50 million support for 06 investment projects, 04 technical assistance projects and 07 Regional Capacity Development Technical Assistance (R-CDTA) projects under ADB Wing for FY 2020-21. An overview of the contracts executed during the financial year is given in Annexure-12. Up to 2016, ADB provided loans on concessional terms and from the Ordinary Capital Resources (OCR) on a London Inter-Bank Offered Rate (LIBOR) basis. The interest rate of COL loan is fixed at 2% and the regular OCR loan interest rate is based on the London Inter-Bank Offered Rate (LIBOR)+50bps with a maturity premium of 0.1% and 0.15% commitment fee on undisbursed amount. Generally ADB loan maturity is 25 years with a grace period of 05 years.

Apart from providing loans/grants to its DMCs, ADB facilitates South Asia Sub-regional Economic Cooperation in transport and communication, energy, information technology, tourism, maritime connectivity and trade facilitation for the economic development of the countries located in the same region.

Over the last 6 years Bangladesh portfolio has gained from USD 6.5 billion to USD 12.03 billion as of 30 June, 2021. ADB has already adjusted its program priorities to help Bangladesh to overcome COVID-19 Pandemic Challenges and provide its support to health & social protection, food security, skill development, rural, water, sanitation, finance among others. ADB has also provided budget support to GoB under its COVID-19 Pandemic Response Option (CPRO).

Graph: Trend of Bangladesh Portfolio of ADB

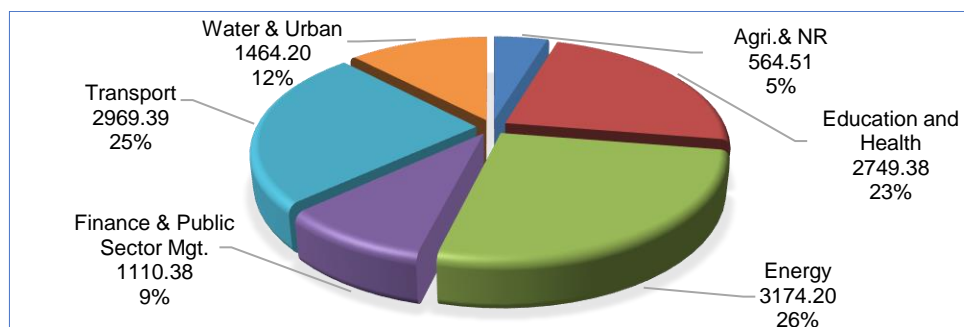

### Important meetings held in the FY 2020-21 of ADB Wing:

In order to address various issues on development intervention and cooperation the following bilateral/tripartite meetings were held virtually. The meetings were held in participation with representatives of various ministries/departments/agencies of the government on financing in Bangladesh. The objective was to explore possible future support and also for reviewing the progress of existing projects in Bangladesh. Due to pandemic situation most of these meetings were held using virtual platform.

#### Meetings held in country

- **Country Programming Mission (CPM):** 02 virtual Country Programming Mission (CPM) meetings were held in Consultation with ADB, including representatives from different ministries/ departments/agencies, to discuss the determination of ADB funding in various development projects.
- **Tripartite Portfolio Review Meeting (TPRM):** 03 virtual Tripartite Portfolio Review Meetings were held among ERD, project implementation ministries/departments and agencies and ADB to review the implementation progress of the project supported by ADB.
- **Wrap up Meeting:** A total of 29 Wrap up Meetings were held during the Consultation/Fact-Finding/Loan Review Mission to finalize ADB's financial support and review the progress of the project.
- **Missions:** 84 missions were fielded during FY 2020-21.
- **Inter-Ministerial Meeting:** 07 inter-ministerial meetings were held to discuss the Draft Loan Documents and to discuss the implementation issues of the ongoing projects/programs.

- **Other Meeting:** 1 SASEC Nodal Officials, 1 SASEC Transport Working Group, 1 SASEC Cross Border Power Trade Working Group and 1 SASEC Custom Subgroup meeting was held.

### Meetings held abroad

- **ADB's Annual Meeting:** The ADB's annual meeting of the ADB's Board of Governors was held on an annual basis to review and set important policies. So far, 54 annual meetings were held for ADB. The 54<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting was held virtually on 03-05 May 2021. The meeting was attended by the Secretary of the Economic Relations Division (ERD) and also Alternate Governor of the ADB's Board of Governors. The theme of the meeting was collaboration for Resilient and Green Recovery.

### Seminars/Workshops/Training

In FY 2020-2021, ADB arranged 43 seminars/workshops/trainings for 181 officials from different ministries/divisions/agencies. All officials virtually joined the program. These seminars/ workshops/trainings helped enhance capacity of the officials.

## 2.6. Wing-6: Coordination and Nordic

Coordination and Nordic Wing plays a vital role in the coordination of the overall economic cooperation activities of the ERD with different Development Partners (DPs) relating to Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Nordic Development Fund (NDF), World Food Programme (WFP) and International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) in Bangladesh. The key function of this Wing is to provide data and information to the President's Office, Prime Minister's Office, and Cabinet Division. Update information for the ECNEC, Cabinet Committee on Govt. Purchase, economic affairs, administrative development and reforms, meetings of Secretaries, implementation of the projects as assured by the Hon'ble Prime Minister, prepare and update work plan to implement National Integration Strategy (NIS).

### 2.6.1. International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD)

International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) is a specialized agency of the United Nations. It was established as an international financial institute in 1977. Priority area of IFAD contribution is aquaculture, technical support in micro-finance, agriculture extension and intensification, rural infrastructure and crop diversification and women empowerment.

#### Current Bangladesh Country Programme of IFAD

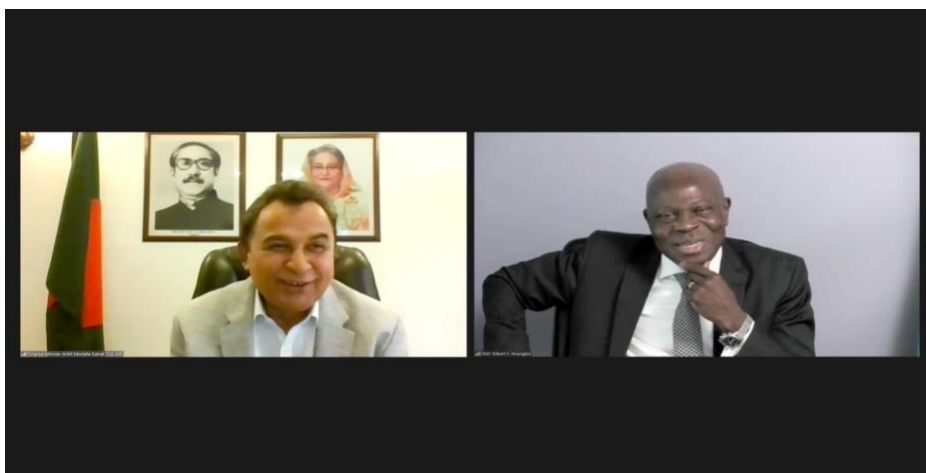
Currently, IFAD is financing seven projects in Bangladesh in partnership with the Ministry of Agriculture (MOA), Local Government Engineering Department (LGED), Palli Karma Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) and Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB). These ongoing projects are befitting 4.5 million households or 18.2 million people, which stands for 20% of the rural population of Bangladesh. There are 7 Development Projects on-going under IFAD assistance **Project List- Annexure-2.f (Page no-190-193).**

Current FY20 IFAD commitment is USD 1.00 million as grant and USD 100.12 million as loan and total amount is USD 101.12 million **Detail Annexure –1.f (Page no-139).**

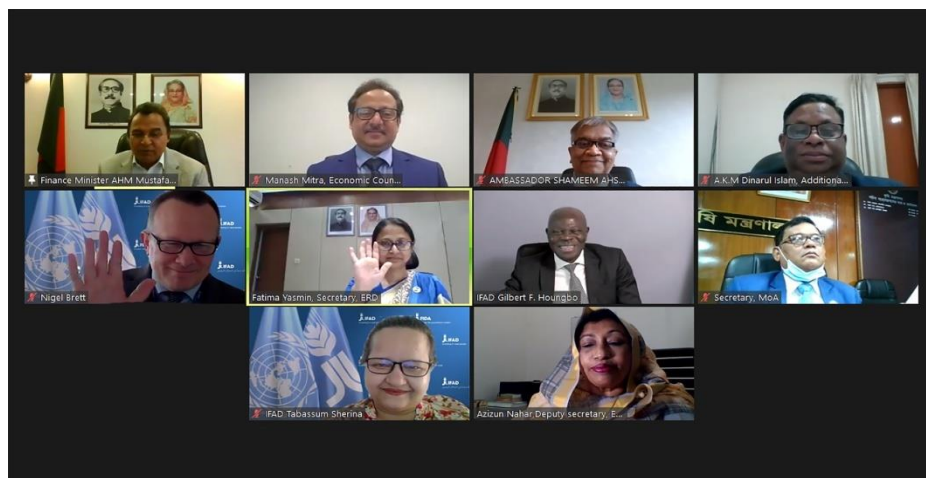

## 2.6.2. WFP operations in Bangladesh

### (i) Capacity Support to the Government

#### 1. Support to reforming programmes for targeted women and children:

WFP has been supporting the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs (MoWCA) in reforming the Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) programme into the Investment Component for Vulnerable Group Development (ICVGD) by adding a one-off cash grant for beneficiaries to invest in income generating activities along

with intensive training and systems improvements. WFP is also supporting MoWCA in designing the Mother and Child Benefit Programme (MCBP) by integrating the ongoing Maternal Allowance (MA) and Lactating Mothers Allowance (LMA) Programmes with improvement of targeting efficiency, G2P payment system, and monthly payments instead of six-monthly payments. These two Programmes are expected to reach more than 10.00 million beneficiaries, once fully operationalized nationwide.

## **2. Support to scale-up School Feeding Programme:**

The objective of the School Feeding Programme is to Support the Ministry of Primary and Mass Education (MoPME) to assist 2.7 million school children with micronutrient fortified biscuits through the School Feeding Programme. In addition, WFP assisted the Ministry to develop the National School Meals Policy which was approved by the Cabinet in 2019. The Government has started scaling up nutritious cooked hot meals in 16 sub-districts in 2020 to distribute cooked hot meals to 400,000 school children. The National School Meal Policy envisions to reach all 16.00 million pre and primary school children in the country by 2025.

## **3. Support for scaling up post-harvest rice fortification:**

WFP has been supporting the Ministry of Food for scaling up distribution of fortified rice to address the prevailing micronutrient deficiencies, primarily for the poor and vulnerable population of the country. The Ministry of Food and MoWCA have been distributing fortified rice among the beneficiaries of Food Friendly Programme (FFP) of MoFood and the ICVGD programme of MoWCA covering over 5.00 million people. Five local companies are producing rice premix kernels and 70 blending units are engaged in blending rice pre-mix kernels with normal rice to produce fortified rice.

## **4. Developing innovative tools for early actions in disaster management:**

WFP has designed an innovative tool called “Forecast-based Financing (FbF)”, which uses reliable weather forecasts to trigger anticipatory actions and release humanitarian funds directly to the pre-listed vulnerable population for pre-agreed activities when weather/climate forecasts indicate an elevated risk. WFP applied this model for the first time in 2019 and again in 2020 flood as an anticipatory early action. More than 10,000 households received 4,500 Taka each on their mobile accounts three days before the flood water hit the trigger point, which minimized losses and damages and reduced the need for assistance in the aftermath. The Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief (MoDMR) has incorporated FbF in the Standing Orders on Disaster (SoD).



### 5. Coordination platform to advocate for nutrition sensitive social protection:

To improve coordination amid the line agencies for taking the nutrition agenda forward, WFP has supported the Cabinet Division to establish a multi-sectoral coordination platform at the Cabinet Division. This platform is effectively advocating at the policy level including undertaking policy analysis, providing policy guidance to line ministries, and advising line ministries to take specific actions for enhancing nutrition outcomes of their safety net programmes.

### 6. Emergency and COVID-19 response:

In response to the multiple emergencies Bangladesh faced last year (COVID-19, monsoon floods and Tropical Cyclone Amphan), WFP reached 400,000 beneficiaries in 2020. WFP's emergency response includes assistance to the poor and vulnerable urban slums in Dhaka North City Corporation in close collaboration with MoWCA and the Ministry of Social Welfare. The lessons learnt from these urban interventions will help design targeted safety-net programmes in urban (such as the VWB Programme by MoWCA).

### 7. Rohingya Response – Cox's bazar

**General Food Assistance:** All Rohingya population in Cox's Bazar receive in-kind food rations of rice, pulses and oil and other commodities through an electronic voucher (e-voucher) modality whereby a family receives a monthly entitlement delivered on a prepaid bio-metric card.

**Nutrition:** WFP provides specialized nutritious foods to children under five years of age, and pregnant and breastfeeding women. In both the host community and the refugee camps, children identified as moderately undernourished are enrolled in a malnutrition treatment programme called Targeted Supplementary Feeding Programme (TSFP). In the refugee camps, all children under the age of five years and pregnant or breastfeeding women benefit from a preventive Blanket Supplementary Feeding Programme (BSFP).

**Targeted Food Assistance:** WFP provides targeted food assistance through implementation of community workfare (cash-for-work) and services, including training on skills to strengthen self-reliance.

**Livelihoods Programme in the Host Community:** WFP has been supporting 45,600 women in host communities in Cox's Bazar to establish linkage with markets and providing them a one-time grant for investment in income-earning activities and monthly allowances for consumption support.

**Site Maintenance Engineering Project (SMEP):** The SMEP project is run jointly by UNHCR, IOM and WFP. The project uses heavy and light machinery and a workforce of over 3500 people from Rohingya and host communities to prepare safer land for

families to relocate to. SMEP engineers are building bridges and roads for safe access, fortifying embankments, and clearing drainage.

### 2.6.3. Nordic Countries related Development Assistance:

Nordic Section assesses, mobilizes, and allocates the development assistance provided by Nordic countries. Within the Nordic countries, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, and Finland are major Development Partners of Bangladesh. In addition, the Nordic Countries Cluster has been introduced as the Nordic Development Fund (NDF), which is the joint multi-lateral development financial institution of Denmark, Sweden, Norway, and Finland has been assisting Bangladesh for a long. There are now 17 ongoing projects under the Nordic section. Denmark has been providing loans/grants in agriculture, water & sanitation, climate change, governance, and rights. Whereas, Sweden has been providing assistance in poverty reduction, strengthening democracy, respect for human rights and gender equality, and sustainable development. NDF is also keen to extend assistance in power, climate change, and private sector partnership development. In the past, Norway assisted in power and energy, investment and trade, education, and private sector development projects. At present, no memorandum of understanding (MoU) between the Government of Bangladesh and the Government of Norway exists.

#### Denmark

Bangladesh and Denmark are maintaining four decades-long partnerships since FY 1972. During this long period, Denmark has been assisting Bangladesh in the areas of agriculture, transportation, rural road networks, water & sanitation, governance, and rights. They have also been supporting Bangladesh to mitigate the negative effects of climate change. Bangladesh Country Programme (BCP) between Government of Denmark and Government of Bangladesh have been extended to 2022 with an additional grant amount of 50 Million DKK equivalent to USD 8.20 for the FY 2020-2021. For the last few years, the Government of Denmark is providing assistance to Bangladesh mainly in three thematic areas under the BCP programme (2013-2021): Agriculture Growth and Employment, Climate Resilience and Sustainable Energy and Governance and Rights. There are 16 Development Projects ongoing under Denmark assistance Project List- **Annexure-2.g (Page no-191-192).**

## 2.7. Wing-7: Europe

Europe Wing deals with the bilateral and multilateral economic cooperation including mobilization of resources from most of the aid providing countries of Europe except Nordic regions. Development Partners of this wing includes European Union; various countries of Europe like-UK, Germany, France, Switzerland, Russian Federation and their development agencies- Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), Agency Francaise De Development (AFD), the Swiss Agency for Development Cooperation (SDC), the Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ), Kreditanstalt Für Wiederaufbau (KfW) and the European Investment Bank (EIB). Development partners provide both loans and grants.

The notable priority sectors under this wing are-power, atomic energy, transport, agriculture, health, education and skill development, water and sanitation, climate change, food security and nutrition, and good governance, renewable energy, and energy efficiency, sustainable urban development, displacement and migration, development of small and medium enterprises.

### 2.7.1. Mobilization

A total of 25 financing agreements have been signed with various development partners under the management of the Europe wing in FY 2020-21 with a total amount of USD 678.49 million [**Annexure-I.g (Page no-140-144)**]. These amounts will be spent in the fields of power, energy, renewable energy, economic infrastructure, and good governance.

#### Germany:

The Federal Republic of Germany has been providing development assistance to Bangladesh since 1972. The total volume of bilateral technical and financial cooperation received from Germany since 1972 has been USD 21.517253 billion (Twenty-one billion point five one seven two five three billion) through the negotiations up to 2020 (signed in June 2021).

Democracy, rule of law, and good governance remain fundamental framework conditions for Bangladesh-German development cooperation. Human rights are also a fundamental principle of German-Bangladesh development policy and provide key guidance when defining the objectives and designing the activities of development cooperation projects.

Most of the supports of Germany is in the form of grants. KfW and GIZ are the two German institutions in Bangladesh through which the German Government is channeling financial assistance and technical assistance in the area of conventional and renewable energy, energy efficiency, good governance, education and skill

development, water and sanitation, climate change, food security and nutrition, sustainable urban development, displacement and migration, sustainable supply chains in the textile sector and support to integrated management of the Sundarbans mangroves, etc. through 20 on-going Development Projects [**Project List- Annexure-2-i, j (Page no-194-197)**].

### Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC):

The Swiss Agency for Development Cooperation (SDC) has been assisting Bangladesh with food aid, commodity aid, and project aid from the Swiss Confederation since FY 1976-77.

Under the Swiss Cooperation Strategy 2018-2021, the SDC engages less in direct service delivery and more in policy influencing and institution-building initiatives. Comparing the SDC's engagement in the previous cooperation strategy with the Swiss Cooperation Strategy 2018-2021 in financial terms, it appears that there is a reduction in development funds from CHF 25 million to CHF 21.6 million per year, which amounts to 13.6% less funding available than in previous years (excluding the funds for Humanitarian Aid). In the present strategy, the main domains are Democratic

Governance (SDC theme Governance, SDG 16) Income and Economic Development (SDC theme employment and economic development, SDGs 1 and 8) and Safer Migration (SDC theme migration, SDGs 1, 5, 8, 10, 16).

#### FCDO [DFID (UK)]:

The United Kingdom (UK) has been providing development assistance to Bangladesh since 1976. The UK Foreign, Commonwealth, and Development office FCDO provided assistance in the area of better governance, reducing extreme poverty, vulnerability to climate change, improving basic health, education, water and sanitation and supporting private sector growth for creation of jobs, etc. Presently DFID has been merged with the Foreign, Commonwealth, and Development office (FCDO).

There is one ongoing Development Project under FCDO assistance **Project List-Annex-2.k (Page no-198)**.

#### Netherlands:

The Royal Netherlands Government has been providing development support to Bangladesh since independence. The assistance is provided in the form of grants and technical assistance. The GoN has made a notable contribution in Bangladesh in the field of land reclamation from different rivers for the development of char. The land reclamation project initiated this concept and the ultimate result is CDSP-I, CDSP-II, CDSP-III, and CDSP-IV. These projects have benefitted thousands of landless people through rehabilitation. Besides, they provided their assistance in the Formulation of Bangladesh Delta Plan-2100. Eighty projects, to be implemented by 2030, have been identified as part of the investment plan under the BDP-2100. Among these eighty (80) projects, sixty-five (65) are physical projects and fifteen (15) are institutional and capacity development projects.

### The European Union:

The bilateral relationship between the Government of Bangladesh and the European Union (EU) has been continuing since 1973. It is one of the largest Development Partners of Bangladesh. The average amount of development assistance to the Government of Bangladesh provided by this organization is about Euro 90-100 million per annum. All EU assistance to Bangladesh is provided as grants. The main areas where the EU provides assistance to Bangladesh are economic development, human rights, good governance and the environment. The office of the European Commission was established in Dhaka in 1982 which was upgraded in 1988 as a full delegation under the Vienna Convention. EU-Bangladesh Framework Agreement was signed in 1984. The first Commercial Cooperation Agreement, signed in 1976, was replaced by an updated Trade and Cooperation Agreement in March 2001.

There are fifteen ongoing Development Projects under the EU assistance, **Project List- Annexure-2.m (Page no-200-201)**.

### Trade and Economic Ties with the EU

European Union trade relations with Bangladesh are based on unilateral trade preferences granted by the EU since 2001 under the GSP Everything But Arms (EBA) duty-free, quota-free market access arrangement for the LDCs. The EU is currently one of the main trading partners of Bangladesh, absorbing more than half of Bangladesh's exports. In the 2019 calendar year, EBA exports from Bangladesh to the EU amounted to more than 16 billion euro. Bangladesh's main export sector to the EU is clothing, which accounts for more than 90% of total EBA imports. Of the rest, products such as frozen food, agro-products, footwear, leather products and bicycles have grown in importance in recent years. The EU exports to Bangladesh are dominated by machinery and transport equipment.

### The EU Assistance to Bangladesh:

From 1972 up to 30 June 2021 EU has disbursed USD 1,995.3 million as grants. The EU has a 7-year programming cycle for international cooperation named Multiannual

Indicative Program (MIP). The MIP 2014-2020 amounting to around Euro 690 million focused on the following 3 sectors:

- i) Strengthening Democratic Governance (103-138 million);
- ii) Food security and Nutrition (276-310 million); and
- iii) Education and skills development (276-310 million).

### **The upcoming Multiannual Indicative Program (MIP) 2021-2027:**

MIP 2014-2020 has ended and the EU has identified three broad areas for future cooperation namely- Human Capital Development, Green Inclusive Development and Good Governance and Just Society. In addition, jointly with the EU member states, two Team Europe initiatives have been identified: 1. Decent Work and 2. Green Energy. The grant contribution has been finalized for **MIP (2021-2027)** for the period 2021-2024, for EUR 306 million, to be complemented, at a later stage, with additional funds for the remaining 2025-2027 period.

### **The European Investment Bank (EIB):**

The European Investment Bank (EIB) created under the Treaty of Rome in 1958, is the foremost financing arm of the European Union (EU). Although the focus of the EIB's operational activities is on the EU Member States, it manages the EU's development cooperation programs covering 160 countries and territories. At present, 4 projects of USD 423 million are ongoing with the financing from EIB. EIB has proposed to give Euro 250 million as a loan for the Covid-19 vaccine support to Bangladesh.

### **Other important achievements of the Europe Wing:**

#### **1. Emergency Support for Textile Sector Bangladesh**

The COVID-19 pandemic has created a public health emergency with immediate economic consequences. Therefore, the European Union and the German government are partnering to support the Government of Bangladesh in safeguarding the livelihoods of vulnerable workers in the garment and leather export-oriented industries who face a heightened risk of being pushed into poverty. For this purpose, temporary cash assistance was provided to workers who were suffering from income losses during the pandemic or have lost their jobs. Eligible workers received up to BDT 3,000 per month/worker for a maximum period of 3 months. They were identified in close coordination with the employers' associations of the textile, garment, and leather industries. The grant with a total volume of euros 113 million provided by the EU (euros 93 million) and Germany (euros 20 million) was channeled through the EU sector budget programme on National Social Security Strategy reforms in Bangladesh.

The support will allow these workers to get through a specific critical period, without major disruption in their lives and consumption levels.



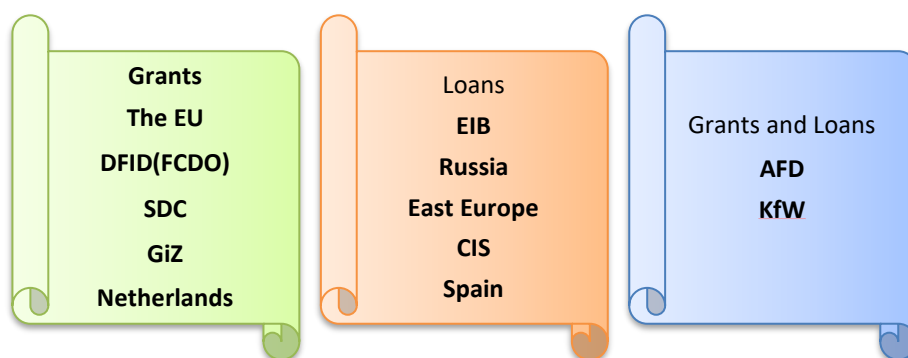

2. Financial and Technical Cooperation (TC & FCs) Agreement on Development Cooperation 2020-2021 was signed on 20 June 2021 between Bangladesh and Germany.
3. Bangladesh-German bilateral consultation on development cooperation meeting ended on 02 March 2020 in Dhaka.

### Current Portfolio:

It is becoming increasingly evident that global development assistance is experiencing a rapid and unprecedented change. However, due to the loan agreement signed for the nuclear power plant, the loan-to-grant ratio increased significantly, as it is a huge project. The current portfolio has direct involvement with eight development partners. As per the report of the Borrowing Program of FY 2020-21, there is a total of 39 projects of USD 1562.67 million.

### Russia:

The bilateral relationship between the Government of Bangladesh and the Russian Federation (former Soviet Union) has been continuing since 1972. Russia has provided USD11.880 billion in both technical and financial support for the ‘Construction of Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant Project’. It is the largest single project support in Bangladesh. The Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant is the only development project ongoing with assistance from Russia. **Project List- Annexure-2.0- (Page no-202).**

### Bangladesh-Russia Intergovernmental Commission on Trade, Economic, Scientific and Technical Cooperation:

Bangladesh-Russia Intergovernmental Commission on Trade, Economic, Scientific and Technical Cooperation (BR-IGC) was formed with the signing of an agreement between Dhaka and Moscow on March 01, 2017. As per the agreement, BR-IGC will have 20 members from each side. Bangladesh, under the leadership of the Secretary of the Economic Relations Division, has already formed the Bangladesh part of the Commission comprising members of various

ministries, government agencies, and the private sector. The first meeting of the Commission was held in Moscow in 2018.

The First meeting encompassed a wide range of areas of cooperation for discussion ranging from trade, investment, power and energy, food, agriculture, fisheries and livestock, science and technology, ICT, education, industry, research, marine transport, and smooth banking transaction. The outcome of the meeting was a Protocol signed between two sides covering various areas of cooperation. The 2<sup>nd</sup> BR-IGC meeting was held in Dhaka on 12-14 November 2019. The 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting was expected to be held this year in Moscow. However, despite the best efforts from both sides, the meeting could not be held due to the worsening Covid situation. Hopefully, this meeting will be held in November 2021.

## **2.8. Wing-8: Asia, JEC and F&F Wing**

The Asia, JEC and F&F wing maintains economic relations with various countries and organizations in the Far East, South-Asia, Southeast Asia and Oceania regions of the Asia continent. This wing is playing the pivotal role in implementing various programmes and projects towards social and economic sector to develop infrastructure and to help in human resources development. The key role of this wing is to mobilise loan & grant assistance and technical assistance from various Asian countries and organisations like India, China, South Korea, Malaysia, Vietnam, Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) and SAARC Development Fund (SDF) for implementation of projects under various government ministries/divisions. In addition to resource mobilisation this wing also deals with the scholarship programme, and various short and long term training courses provided by the Development Partners. Further more, conducting Joint Economic Commission (JEC) with eight (08) countries of the Asia continent is an integral part of the wing.

A brief development co-operations among Asian countries and notable works performed in the financial year 2020-21 from Asia, JEC and F&F wing is given below:

### **2. Significant activities in fiscal year 2020-21**

#### **A. India**

India is one of the development partners of Bangladesh since FY 1972. Despite significant trade deficit with India, the two countries have recently taken effective steps to improve economic relation. During the visit of the Hon'ble Prime Minister of Bangladesh to India on January 2010, a new window was opened to develop the existing economic relations between the two friendly countries. In this visit, a joint declaration was signed. The focused area of Indian support is Road transport, railway communication, shipping, civil aviation, local government, telecommunications, expansion of economic zones, power sector, improve infrastructure, employment, empowerment of women and to preserve cultural and natural heritage of Bangladesh.

Under Indian LoC a total of 43 (forty three) projects were taken out of which 14 (fourteen) projects has been completed, 15 (fifteen) projects are going on and the remaining 14 (fourteen) projects are in various stages of preparation. In the last financial year, 03 (three) high level LoC Review Meeting were held to monitor the progress of the implementation of LoC projects. As a result of these initiatives, 01 (one) project was approved by the highest Authority of the Government of Bangladesh i.e ECNEC and a total of USD 140.393 million was disbursed against various projects in the same fiscal year.

In addition, 03 (three) separate MoUs worth USD 6.73 million (2.90 + 2.94 + 0.69) have been signed against 03 (three) projects for implementation in the Local Government, Information and Communication Technology and Education sectors

with Indian grant in FY 2020-21. Moreover, Indian Government provided 109 ambulances to prevent COVID-19 situation in Bangladesh in the fiscal year 2020-21.

07 (seven) Development Projects are ongoing under Indian assistance **Project List- Annexure-2.p (Page no-203).**

## B. China

China provides investment and grants assistance in various sectors for socio-economic development of Bangladesh, such as infrastructure development, telecommunication, ICT, industry, power and energy, communication, railway, agriculture, disaster management, health, education etc. China has financed in various projects for economic development of Bangladesh. Some important projects are: Padma Bridge Rail Link Project, Construction of Multilane Tunnel under the River Karnaphuli, Padma (Jashaldia) Water Treatment, Establishment of IV Tier National Data Center, Procurement of Six Vessels, Dasherbandi Sewerage Treatment Plant, Shahjalal Fertilizer Project, Modernization of Telecommunication Network for Digital Connectivity (MoTN), Expansion and Strengthening of Power System Network under DPDC Area Project, Power Grid Network Strengthening Project under PGCB etc.

Currently 09 (nine) projects amounting to USD 7.10 billion is ongoing under loan assistance of China Exim Bank (Annexer-1). During the visit of Hon'ble President of China a MoU was signed in which 27 (twenty seven) projects amounting to approximately USD 20 billion is included in 2016. Among these 27 (twenty seven) projects, Loan Agreements for 07 (seven) projects amounting to USD 6.67 billion has been signed up to June 2020. Loan Agreements for 01 (one) project is under process for signing and 05 (five) projects have been initially approved by the Chinese Authority, In addition, 06 (six) projects are under evaluation with the Chinese Authority and remaining 08 projects are in different stages such as, project document preparation, approval etc. Some loan agreements have been signed under Chinese assistance in 2019-20, these are, Expansion and Strengthening of Power System Network under DPDC Area Project and Power Grid Network Strengthening Project under PGCB

China Government has constructed 7 Bangladesh-China friendship bridges until now on different rivers of riverine country Bangladesh which has played an important role for developing communication system. Currently 8th Bangladesh-China friendship bridge is under construction with Chinese grant assistance and China has expressed eagerness to construct more 3 bridges. Bangladesh-China Friendship Exhibition Centre has been completed with Chinese grant assistance in Purbachal which is worth BDT 675.70 crore. Besides, under the signed MoU on Plan of Special Assistance Projects of Disaster Prevention and Reduction, Chinese Government will provide grant assistance to construct National Emergency Operation Center (NEOC) in Tejgaon, Dhaka.

An Economic and Technical Cooperation Agreement was signed on 04 July, 2019 under which Chinese government will provide Bangladesh government 500 million RMB Yuan (about BDT 611.50 crore/ USD 72.37 million) grant assistance. This grant assistance will be used for different welfare projects, such as, disaster management, bridge construction and other projects according to discussion and mutual understanding of both countries.

Chinese Government provided some in-kind assistance to prevent COVID-19 situation in Bangladesh, such as, Corona Virus Test Kits, Medical protective clothing, Infrared Thermometers, Surgical N95 mask, medical protective goggles, Surgical masks, 16 lacs doses of COVID-19 vaccine with similar number of disposable syringes.

There are 9 Development Projects on going under China assistance; **Project List-Annexure- 2.q (Page no-204).**

### **C. South Korea**

The Republic of Korea (ROK) is one of the most important development partners of Bangladesh has and is consistently increasing operations in Bangladesh. Although the ROK has various channels to provide external financing, Bangladesh has resorted to financing from only the following two channels:

- a. Economic Development Cooperation Fund (EDCF)
- b. Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA)

### C.1. Assistance from EDCF to Bangladesh

The Government of Korea established the Economic Development Cooperation Fund (EDCF) in June 1987 for extending bilateral ODA loans to the developing countries. The Korea Exim Bank is responsible for management of the EDCF, including project appraisal, execution of loan agreements and evaluation after project completion. Operations of EDCF commenced in Bangladesh through signing an agreement on the 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1997. Since its inception, EDCF has been providing soft loans to Bangladesh to implement development projects. Currently, implementation of 8 development projects with financing from EDCF are ongoing. On 29 January 2018, a Framework Arrangement for the period of 2017-2020 was signed to provide USD 500.00 million for development projects in Bangladesh. Recently, Framework Arrangement for the period 2021-2025 has been finalized in June 2021 and is expected to be signed by September 2021. Total allocation under this new Framework Arrangement is expected to be USD 700.00 million. During the FY 2020-21, total disbursement from EDCF has been USD 117.36 million, of which USD 50.00 million has been allocated to mitigate the adverse impacts of Covid-19 pandemic.

## C.2. KOICA's Activities in Bangladesh

Economic relationship between the GoB and Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) started on 16 June 1993 by signing a bilateral agreement. Since its inception, total 31 projects of USD 126.02 million have been undertaken with grants from KOICA, of which 23 projects with commitment of USD 62.99 have been completed and the rest 8 projects of USD 58.27 million are currently ongoing. During the FY 2020-21, USD 6.02 million were disbursed by KOICA.

Apart from funding projects with grants, every year, KOICA invites a significant number of officials from different sectors of Bangladesh to attend various training/ seminar/ workshop held in South Korea. KOICA also dispatches volunteers for a period of 2 years to impart training in Bangladesh in various fields. According to recent trends, more than 200 delegates are dispatched every year to work in Bangladesh in various capacities such as project experts, advisors, doctors and volunteers.

## C.3. Total Flow of Resources from South Korea

List of the 7 ongoing development projects funded by Korea is enclosed in Annexure-2. Synopsis of total assistance from Korea since FY94 is given below:

## KOICA's Training and Volunteer Programme

Every year, KOICA invites a significant number of officials from different sectors of Bangladesh to attend various training/seminar/workshop held in South Korea. KOICA also dispatches volunteers for a period of 2 years to impart training in various fields. At Present, more than 200 delegates are dispatched every year to work in Bangladesh in various capacities such as project experts, advisors, doctors and volunteers.

## C.4. Knowledge Sharing Programme (KSP)

Korea went through phenomenal stages of development that turned the country as one of the prominent hubs of innovation and technology .To disseminate their experience, Korea regularly arranges idea exchanging events, which is known as KSP, with the Government offices in Bangladesh. Under KSP , several Korean agencies such as Korean Centre for International Economic Studies (CIES), Korean Development Institute (KDI), Korea Fixed Income Research Institute (KFIRI), Korean Capital Market, Sookmyung Women's University (SWU), Korea Institute of Advancement of Technology (KIAT) etc. engage in idea exchanging events to disseminate their learnings to countries like Bangladesh .

## D. Asian Infrastructure and Investment Bank

The central focus of the operations of the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) is to support building physical infrastructure in the Asia-Pacific region with a view to improving social and economic conditions in countries across the region. The Bank was proposed by China in 2013 and the initiative was launched at a ceremony in Beijing in October 2014. The Bank began its operations in January 2016.

As one the founding members of the Bank, Bangladesh has been availing of the facilities of AIIB and so far, have secured commitment of USD 2.079 billion from the Bank. Out of the total, USD 1.43 billion have been committed against 8 development projects and USD 650 million for Covid-19 related schemes. During the FY 2020-21, AIIB committed USD 1.174 billion against 5 projects.

## **E. Australia**

A MoU between GoB and Australian government was signed on 20 October 1999 on Development cooperation assistance. Since then as a development partner of Bangladesh Australia provided A\$ 900.00 million as grant support in areas of health, education, social security, climate change, water and sewerage development. In addition, about USD 100.00 million has also been disbursed through different NGOs.

### **E.1. Australia Awards Scholarships-Masters Programme (AusAID)**

Under the Australia Awards Scholarship Programme 2021, 15 (fifteen) candidates from Bangladesh were nominated, of which 08 were female and 07 were male. Owing to travel restrictions imposed as Covid-19 broke out, short courses under Aus AID could not be conducted in 2021.

## **G. Bangladesh-Sweden Trust Fund**

The Bangladesh-Sweden Trust Fund has been in operation for more than last 4 decades. The Fund is utilized mainly for providing travel grants to Bangladeshi students who pursue their studies abroad. The Trust Fund was established with endowment grants from Sweden. During FY 2020-21, travel grants of Taka 21.15 million were allocated to 875 students.

## **2.9. Wing-9: Foreign Aid Budget and Accounts (FABA) & ICT**

Foreign Aid Budget and Accounts (FABA) Wing is regarded as the central data bank of ERD. FABA Wing records and stores all information related to foreign assistance and reports to the government as needed. On the other hand, all the activities related to the annual development programme budget, foreign assistance receipt budget, foreign loan repayment budget and resource budget, formulation and allocation for foreign subsidy projects are carried out by this Wing. At the same time, the management of foreign debt of the government is also performed by this specialized Wing. The major functions of FABA Wing in the FY 2020-21 are presented below:

### **2.9.1 Activities related to the estimation and implementation of foreign assistance targets**

#### **Commitment**

A borrowing programme is created to estimate the target of the commitment for the FY 2021. In this borrowing programme, a total of USD 6,000.00 million foreign assistance commitments were projected from 26 Development Partners. On the basis of the probability of contract signing, the proposals of foreign assistance are divided into two categories namely, highly probable and probable. In the process of implementation of this estimation, the review meeting is held with ERD's Wing Chiefs every month with the Secretary as the Chair. Data from foreign assistance agreements are collected and recorded on the Data Management and Financial Analysis System (DMFAS). During the aforementioned fiscal year, total 83 numbers of agreements amounting USD 9349.94 million were signed, which is 155.83% of the estimates.

#### **Disbursement**

Disbursement was estimated at USD 8238.00 million in the financial year 2020-21. This estimation was made by analyzing the requirements of foreign assistance for about 308 current projects in the ADP and the unspent but usable foreign assistance. The information about foreign assistance disbursement is mainly collected directly from the Development Partners, and on a quarterly basis, these information are collected from the concerned section/branch of ERD for verification. At the end of the financial year, this disbursement information is reconciled with Development Partners. In the current financial year, total amount of disbursements amounts USD 7212.13 million (provisional), which is 87.55% of the revised estimate.

### **2.9.2 Annual Development Programme related Activities**

#### **Annual Development Programme (ADP) and Revised ADP**

The project-based allocation is taken in view of the availability of foreign assistance after meeting with the concerned ministries/divisions and project directors.

Before this meeting, the requirements of project assistance from ministries/divisions are collected. In the Annual Development Programme, BDT 70502.00 crore (USD

8294.00 million) and BDT 212.50 crore (USD 20.00 million) were allocated as project assistance and food assistance respectively for 329 projects in 17 sectors. This allocation has been provided to the 53 ministries/divisions/agencies implementing the project. As the demand for project assistance from the project implementing Ministries/Divisions decreased, the allocation of project assistance to the revised ADP was reduced to BDT 63,000 crore (USD 7411.00 million).

### **Review of the Use of Foreign Assistance for ADP Projects**

In the revised ADP, the allocation of project assistance from almost every ministry/division has to be decreased as the demand for project assistance, in comparison to ADP, also declines. Implementation problems of the projects from the concerned ministries/divisions are analyzed to identify the main reasons for the implementation of the project to take necessary steps.

## **2.9.3 Functions relating to Management of Foreign Debt**

### **Functions related to Repayment of Foreign Debt**

For the repayment of principal and interest of foreign loan in the revised budget of the FY 2019-20, BDT 12750.00 crore (USD 1500.00) and BDT 5525.00 crore (USD 650.00) respectively (total BDT 18275.00 crore, equivalent to USD 2150.00 million) have been allocated in the budget. Under this allocation, the total amount paid is BDT 16238.98.02 crore (USD 1914.81 million), of which the Principal payments amount BDT 2031.06 crore (USD 1418.63 million) and the Interest payments amount BDT 4207.9 crore (USD 496.18 million).

### **Debt Accounting**

FABA Wing has been using 'Debt Management and Financial Analysis System (DMFAS)' software of UNCTAD since 1992. From this Wing, the information required for all foreign loans in the system is updated regularly. This makes it easier to obtain updated foreign debt information and future projections. As a result, the stability of the debt sustainability of foreign debt can be easily assessed and analysed.

## **2.9.4 Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Cell**

The ICT Cell of the Economic Relations Division started operations under a technical project in which was amalgamated 1990. Currently, the cell is implementing a long-term plan to implement the vision “Digital Bangladesh” by 2021 and Knowledge-based developed country by 2041.

The cell is operating under Wing-9 (FABA and ICT wing) of this Division. There are four first class, one third-class and two fourth class employees are working.

#### **Key Responsibilities:**

1. Management of different applications software; such as FAMS, AIMS, DMFAS, ERDPEDIA, BSTF etc.;
2. Keeping the website live and updated;
3. e-Nothi Systems Management;
4. Ensuring the internet connectivity of the division;
5. Management of Local Area Network (LAN);
6. Wi-Fi Device and Connection Management;
7. Maintenance and Troubleshooting of Hardware and Software;
8. Performing e-Procurement related activities;
9. Maintenance and Management of Digital Attendance Devices;
10. Providing Training on different ICT Applications;
11. Maintenance and Management of official email system;
12. Implementation of the Instructions of the National Information and Communication Technology Policy 2018

#### **Information and communication technology activities**

Initiatives are being taken to increase the capacity of the cell. Purchasing of necessary infrastructure, hardware and software is going on. There are about 300 desktop computers, 28 laptops, 13 servers, 203 printers, 133 scanners, 30 webcams in different models for the daily operations. There is a training lab with 24 desktop computers. 300 Mbps internet bandwidth from BTCL is being used in ERD. In addition an alternative 120 Mbps internet bandwidth is being used from private ISP. The ERD's own website [www.erd.gov.bd](http://www.erd.gov.bd) is being update regularly. The use of Wi-Fi has been extended to entire office.

## 2.9.5 Other Important Functions

### Information Report Preparation and Supply

The foreign assistance information report is prepared and sent to ERD's different wings and other ministries/divisions. It is important to note that information is exchanged regularly with the Finance Division and Bangladesh Bank. Furthermore, FABA Wing represents/coordinates the Resource Committee, Cash and Debt Management Committee, extended meeting of the Planning Commission, Co-ordination Council on the Government's Monetary Currency and Currency Exchange Rate, the Budget Monitoring & Resources Committee and budget preparation process and policy matters.

### National Budget Preparation

As part of the National Budget Preparation Programme, FABA works with the Finance Division on budget allocation and modification of project assistance in the budget and development budget.

### **Transmitting information to the Parliament**

FABA answers the questions raised in the Parliament during the parliamentary session and provides information to the meeting of the Standing Committee.

### **Exchanging information with Development Partners**

FABA exchanges information about foreign assistance on a quarterly basis with various Development Partners.

### **Exchanges with representatives of various foreign missions**

FABA exchanges the overall status of foreign assistance with representatives of missions of other organizations including the World Bank and IMF.

### **Debt Assessment of Bangladesh**

FABA provides information about the latest status of foreign debt and debt sustainability with credit rating institutions like Moody's Investors Service (Moody's), Standard and Poor's (S&P), Fitch Ratings.

### **Secretarial Duties**

FABA Wing provides secretarial support to the Standing Committee on Non-concessional Loan, Fast Track Project Monitoring Committee and Fast Track Project Monitoring Taskforce. It is to be noted that FABA is also providing secretarial assistance in carrying out the functions of the 'Committee on Structured and Systematic Change Recommendations at the project preparation and implementation stage' and 'Technical Committee on Checklist Review of Project Preparation', to mobilize the implementation of the project during this financial year.

### **Annual Publication**

FABA Wing compiles and publishes ERD's annual publication, titled 'Flow of External Resources in Bangladesh'.

## **2.10 Wing-10: Development Effectiveness**

### **Background:**

In recent years, there has been a paradigm shift in the foreign assistance and development cooperation milieu globally. The purpose is to focus more on the country ownership over the development process, inclusive partnerships, measurable outcomes; transparency and mutual accountability amid the partners. In this backdrop, the Development Effectiveness (DE) Wing emerged as a specialized wing of ERD on 22 September 2015.

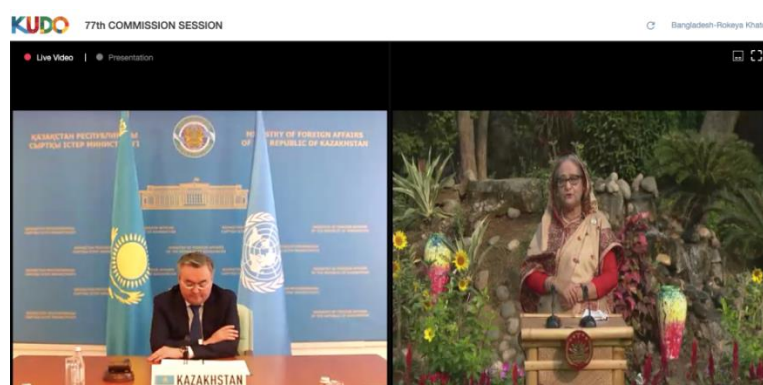
### **Major Activities:**

In 2020-2021, the Economic Relations Division (ERD) played critical role through active participation in UNESCAP's different programmes which involved all activities of 09 (nine) committees of the organization. During this period, the following initiatives have been undertaken for heightening the mutual relationship.

### **Hon'ble Prime Minister's Speech in the 77<sup>th</sup> Annual Session of ESCAP**

Hon'ble Prime Minister H.E. Sheikh Hasina delivered her speech through video message in the Opening Ceremony of the 77<sup>th</sup> Annual Session of UNESCAP held on 26-29 April 2021 on virtual platform. In her address on "Building back better from crises through regional cooperation in Asia and the Pacific," the Prime Minister emphasized the need for joint efforts to combat the Covid-19 pandemic citing regional cooperation as the most effective way to prosperity. She proposed four points: 1st, extending cooperation by the developed countries, enhanced partnerships and international financial institutions; 2nd, to adopt an inclusive, resilient and environmentally friendly development approach for overcoming the crisis; 3rd, the adoption of efficient policies and strategies by the Asia-Pacific region to ensure a strong and inclusive public health system; and 4th, to establish uninterrupted communication in trade, transport, energy, ICT, science and technology. In addition, the Prime Minister highlighted on the South-South Cooperation, SAARC, BIMSTEC, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal (BBIN), Asian Highway and Trans-Asian Railway Network and the initiative of Asia-Pacific Cross Border Paperless Trade. The proposal of the Hon'ble Prime Minister had been unanimously adopted in the session.

VNR 2020 was of special significance as all the SDG Goals were reviewed in-depth in the VNR reports. Bangladesh's VNR Report was presented in the Forum on 13 July 2020 at 20:45 hrs (Local Time). The country VNR featured the speech of Hon'ble Minister, Ministry of Planning, Mr. Shamsul Alam, Senior Secretary of the General Economic Division of Planning Commission and Ms. Zuena Aziz, Principal Coordinator, SDG Affairs, Prime Minister's Office. Besides, a video clip highlighting Bangladesh's progress in attaining SDGs followed by a Q/A Session were presented during the specified time period. Respected Secretary, Economic Relations Division attended the Forum's virtual meeting on VNR 2020.

### Istanbul Programme of Action

The Istanbul Programme of Action (IPoA) was adopted in the fourth United Nations LDC Conference held in 2011 aiming to help graduate at least half of the 48 Least Developed Countries from LDC status by 2020. To persuade this, eight development priorities and corresponding actions were identified in the IPoA for the LDCs namely : 1. Productive Capacity 2. Agriculture, Food Security and Rural Development 3. Trade 4. Commodities 5. Human and Social Development 6. Multiple Crises and Other Emerging Challenges 7. Mobilizing Financial Resources for Development and Capacity Building and 8. Good Governance at All Levels. As many as 48 ministries of the Government of Bangladesh are directly or indirectly involved in implementation of the Programme. Successful implementation of this Programme is closely linked to the graduation of Bangladesh within stipulated time.

**The standard values against three criteria determined by the United Nations to be attained by the LDCs for graduation are:** (a) Per Capita Income (b) Human Asset Index (c) Economic Vulnerability Index. Successful implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action eventually leads to attaining the determinant values of the criteria. Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics measures progress of attainment of the values based on measuring the implementation of the Programme of Action by various ministries/divisions.

A ‘Coordination and Monitoring Committee’ has been constituted with Cabinet Secretary as the Chair to oversee implementation of the Programme of Action on fast track basis. Besides, a sub-committee has been formulated in the Economic Relations Division under the supervision/ chairmanship of Additional Secretary (DE Wing) for providing secretariat support to the afore-said Committee. The sub-committee conducted quarterly meeting every three months with the focal points of the concerned ministries/divisions and held discussion on the following issues:

- Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics collected and collated data regularly against the three criteria (GNI, HAI, EVI) in persuasion of graduation of Bangladesh from LDC in 2<sup>nd</sup> round by the United Nations in 2021 and placed before the committee;
- The Final National Report of Bangladesh on implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action (IPoA) had been prepared in collaboration of the relevant Ministries and Divisions;
- The UN-OHRLLS (Office of the High Representative of LDCs and Landlocked developing countries and Small island developing states) is acting as the secretariat for implementation of Istanbul Programme of Action. ERD has submitted the Final National Report of Bangladesh on implementation of the IPoA in January 2020 in response to the requirements of UN-OHRLLS.
- The Final National Report was placed before the Coordination and Monitoring Committee led by the Cabinet Secretary for approval before submission to the UN-OHRLLS.

#### **Colombo Plan:**

- The Colombo Plan Secretariat organized four Council Meeting in 2019-2020. The representative of Bangladesh High Commission in Sri Lanka attended the meetings as every year.
- In 2019-20 FY, ERD subscribed annual fee USD 17,400 to the Colombo Plan Secretariat (CPS) and USD 14,388 to the Colombo Plan Staff College (CPSC).
- Necessary arrangements have been undertaken for the government officials to participate in the technical and contemporary development training programmes offered and organized by the Colombo Plan Secretariat and Colombo Plan Staff College.

#### **Commonwealth:**

- The Commonwealth Finance Ministers Meeting (CFMM) was held on 17 October, 2019 in the Head Quarter of IMF, Washington D.C, USA. The theme of the meeting was ‘Preventing Debt Crisis: The Role of Creditors and Debtors’. The meeting was represented by the high level government official.

- In 2019-20 FY, the annual voluntary contribution of the Government of Bangladesh subscribed to the Commonwealth Foundation amounted 22,500 Pound Sterling and Commonwealth Fund for Technical Cooperation amounted 1,48,704 Pound Sterling.

## Webinar on Effectiveness in Action: Current Perspective on Partnerships, Challenges & Solutions at Country Level (22 October 2020)



This webinar takes place on 22 October 2020, 8-10:00 am NYC/2 – 4:00 pm Paris time on Zoom. It focused on partner country perspectives on the most pressing effectiveness issues, challenges and lessons learnt in the evolving development co-operation partnership and COVID-19 landscape.

Ms. Fatima Yasmin, Secretary, Economic Relations Division representing H.E. Mr. A H M Mustafa Kamal, Minister of Finance, Bangladesh delivered High Level Remarks as Co-chairs of GPEDC. In the face of COVID-19, how partners work together was key to building back better with an expectations of considerable impact on the development trajectories during the ‘Decade of Action’ towards the 2030 SDG deadline.

### Following issues raised questions that this webinar sought to address:

1. What are the biggest effectiveness challenges in your country (reflecting also on the results of the Global Partnership monitoring)? What are the main challenges for staying true to the four principles for effective development co-operation in today’s new realities? What collective actions are necessary?
2. How has COVID-19 affected any (or all) of these challenges? Has COVID-19 also led to accelerating any welcome development co-operation practices at country level – from the perspective of all partners? If so, how can such change and the momentum be sustained in the spirit of

building back better and to fast-track the ‘Decade of Action’ for SDG implementation?

3. How have you been able to mobilize your development co-operation stakeholders to follow up on effectiveness issues and commitments (including in the follow up to the Global Partnership monitoring)? What are the emerging lessons learnt?

# CHAPTER 3

## COMPANIES UNDER THE DIVISION



### 3.1. Infrastructure Development Company Limited (IDCOL)

Infrastructure Development Company Limited (IDCOL), a government owned public limited company, incorporated on 14 May 1997, started its journey as a non-bank financial institution on February 1998 with a nominal paid up capital of BDT 1 lac only. With an equity contribution of BDT 35 crore from the Government of Bangladesh (GoB), the company's paid up capital now stands at BDT 650 crore, remaining being generated out of company's retained earnings, portrays an exemplary performance of the company over the years. Since its inception, IDCOL has been playing a major role in bridging the financing gap for developing large infrastructure, renewable energy and energy efficiency projects in Bangladesh.

The primary objective of the company is to promote significant participation of the private sector in investment and operation, ownership and maintenance of new infrastructure facilities. Total loan portfolio of IDCOL now stands at BDT 7,912.7 crore consisting BDT 1,638.1 crore in renewable energy sector, BDT 3,184.2 crore in power sector, BDT 95.3 crore in telecommunication & IT sector, BDT 234.4 crore in ports, BDT 1,212.2 crore in energy efficiency and BDT 1,548.6 crore in other sectors. Besides, under its initiatives to finance renewable energy programs and projects, IDCOL has disbursed more than BDT 1,269.3 crore as grant support. IDCOL has a target to finance an amount of BDT 2,049.4 crore during FY 2021 in various infrastructure development projects like power, energy efficiency, information technology, tourism, communication, port etc.

IDCOL started Solar Home System (SHS) program in January 2003 to fulfill basic electricity requirement of the rural people living in off-grid areas of Bangladesh by 2021. IDCOL SHS program has been acclaimed as the largest off-grid electrification program in the world. Till date, about 4.13 million SHSs have been installed under the program with an installed capacity of 185 MWp in the remote areas where electrification through grid expansion was challenging and costly. Thus, the program has ensured supply of solar electricity to 18 million people i.e. 12% of the country's total population who previously used kerosene lamps for lighting purpose.

In addition, IDCOL has financed more than 57,092 biogas plants, 2.46 million of Improved Cooking Stoves (ICS), 1,515 Solar Irrigation Pumps (SIP), 26 Solar Mini Grids (SMG), 10 biogas based power plants, 11 Rooftop Solar projects and 138 solar power based telecom towers till December 2020 through

Participating Organizations and direct disbursement. In its drive towards promoting alternative sources of energy, IDCOL finances projects and programs that utilize various forms of renewable sources. Through startup subsidy, concessionary credit and capacity development support, IDCOL complements the Government's mission of generating 4.5% of the country's total electricity from renewable sources by 2021 and 10% by 2025. All these programs of IDCOL are playing a vital role in ensuring the energy security of the country.

However, in recent times, Partner Organizations (PO) under Solar Home Systems Program are facing with downturn in business due to market contraction and unhealthy competition with non-registered organizations and suppliers of low quality Solar Home Systems.

From the very beginning, IDCOL has been operating as a profitable organization. It was one of the few government owned organizations those pay dividend to the government on a regular basis. After a couple of decades, the company now stands as the market leader in private sector energy and infrastructure financing in Bangladesh. IDCOL has already emerged as a development financial institution and a partner of choice.

#### Mentionable achievements of IDCOL in financial year 2020:

- Total asset stood at BDT 9,820.13 crore at the end of the year.
- Overall percentage of loan repayment was 92.74%.
- Percentage of classified loan was 1.53%.
- IDCOL reported gross revenue of BDT 448.22 crore, profit before tax and provision was BDT 318.17 crore and net profit after tax was BDT 153.48 crore.
- Retained earnings was BDT 207.89 crore at the end of the year.
- IDCOL has paid a dividend of BDT 130 crore to the government of Bangladesh from its retained earnings out of which cash dividend was BDT 65 crore and bonus share was issued for an amount of BDT 65 crore.
- Paid up capital of the company increased to BDT 715 crore from last year's figure of BDT 650 crore.
- During the period, the company contributed a total amount of BDT 87.53 crore as corporate tax, BDT 1.44 crore was deducted as tax at source (TDS), BDT 2 crore was deducted as VAT at source (VDS) and

BDT 65 crore was paid as cash dividend to the government. In total BDT 155.97crore was contributed to the national exchequer.

**Other achievements of IDCOL in recent times:**

- IDCOL received “ICMAB Best Corporate Award-2019” under Non-Bank Financial Institution (NBFI) category.
- IDCOL has been awarded as the country’s Top Taxpayer for the assessment year 2019-20 in the category of Non-Bank Financial Institutions.
- IDCOL won “Karlsruhe Sustainable Finance Awards 2020” in the category of “Outstanding Sustainable Project Financing” for the Solar Irrigation Pump Projects by the European Organization for Sustainable Development (EOSD).
- IDCOL got approval from Green Climate Fund (GCF) of USD 250 million concessional credit facility for implementing projects titled ‘Promoting private sector investment through large scale adoption of energy-saving technologies’ and ‘Equipment for Textile and RMG sectors of Bangladesh’.
- IDCOL signed the first credit facility with the Agence Française de Développement (AFD), France for EUR 100 million to finance energy-efficient, renewable energy and environment friendly projects.
- IDCOL was appointed by the Climate Vulnerable Forum for analyzing the Power Sector under the “Mujib Climate Prosperity Plan” of Bangladesh.

## **3.2. Infrastructure Investment Facilitation Company (IIFC)**

### **About IIFC**

IIFC is a Company Limited by Guarantee having no shares under Economic Relations Division, Ministry of Finance, Government of Bangladesh, registered with the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies & Firms (RJSC), Bangladesh under Section 28 of the Companies Act, 1994. It was incorporated in 1999 with the aim of facilitating more private sector investments in infrastructure development. During the initial years of operation, the Company was financed by the Government of Bangladesh (GoB), IDA and supported by consultants financed by the Department for International Development (DFID) of UK and Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). Both CIDA and DFID support have ended in December 2003 and May 2004 respectively. Support from GOB ended in mid 2005 and support from Private Sector Infrastructure Development Project (PSIDP) has ended on March 2007. From April 2007, IIFC has been completely self-sustaining. In fact, IIFC has made significant progress both financially and operationally after 2007.

IIFC specializes in public and private procurement and PPP transaction, research, survey and feasibility studies, financial and economic analysis, impact assessment, training and capacity building, institutional reforms, policy and advocacy. The company works internationally.

IIFC's two core areas of operations are to developing projects and extending project related advisory services and providing capacity building supports to its clients- both private and public sectors. The company is bidding for consultancy services to private and public sectors and expanding its businesses at home and abroad.

### **Board of Directors**

The company has a seven-member Board of Directors. The overall policy making decisions of IIFC are vested with the Board of Directors. Three directors are from government; three from private sector and the Managing Director is an ex-officio member of the Board. Ms. Fatima Yasmin, Secretary, Economic Relations Division is the Chairman of IIFC and Mr. Md. Shahabuddin Patwary, Additional Secretary (PRL), World Bank Wing is the Managing Director of IIFC.

### **Objectives**

IIFC's primary goal is to facilitate private investment in infrastructure in Bangladesh. With this focus, it has adopted the following set of objectives:

- To introduce, promote, encourage, facilitate and assist all and form of private sector participation through Public-Private Partnership (PPP)

- To assist and advise Ministries, government departments, agencies and other public sector bodies with the identification, prioritization, preparation, evaluation, award and implementation of PPP infrastructure projects in which the private sector may participate.
- To assist the private sector to identify, understand, bid for, evaluate and negotiate PPP infrastructure projects.
- To research, collate, publish and otherwise provide technical regulatory, procure finance, statistical, demographic, geographic, political, economic, procurement and other relevant information and policy for the purposes of encouraging PPP in infrastructure projects.

### 4.3 Continued Success of Economic Relations Division in Implementing the Annual Performance Agreement (APA)

The Annual Performance Agreement (APA) has been introduced with the purpose of promoting greater transparency and accountability in the Government organizations, proper utilization of resources and increasing institutional efficiency. The Economic Relations Division (ERD) has been signing the APA with the Cabinet Division since FY 2014-15. As per the agreement, like other Ministries/Divisions, ERD has undertaken relentless efforts not only to implement the mandatory strategic goals, but also to successfully implement the specialized strategic goals specially bestowed upon this division.

ERD has consistently been successful in negotiating and signing of agreements with the Development Partners; achieving the commitment and disbursement targets; improving the utilization capacity of foreign assistance; and in the areas of external debt management and debt servicing. Initially, several effective steps were taken by this division to achieve the specific targeted goals of the APA. Under the direction and direct supervision of the Secretary of the division, efforts were further strengthened to increase the mobilization of foreign assistance and its utilization at the desired level. Consequently, it became possible to achieve 94.91%, 94.38%, 91.88% and 87.59% success in FY 2016-17, FY 2017-18, FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20 respectively as against the APA targets of the respective year. The finalizing of the progress of achievement of the APA for FY 2020-21 is under process.

As part of the implementation of the APA, ERD has been able to obtain a commitment of USD 34.53 (average USD 11.51) billion foreign assistance from FY 2017-18 to FY 2019-20. This commitment is 14% higher than that of previous three years (FY 2014-15 to FY 2016-17). On the other hand, the total amount of foreign assistance disbursement from FY 2017-18 to FY 2019-20 was USD 20.03 (average 6.68) billion which is 95.8% higher than those of previous three years (FY 2014-15 to FY 2016-17).

As a result of continued adoption of prudent policy in maintaining the external debt and debt servicing to a sustainable level, Bangladesh's foreign debt and debt repayment are still at a satisfactory level as per the internationally acceptable indicators. The Economist magazine recently ranked a list of 66 emerging stable economies according to four measures of financial strengths including public debt as a percentage of GDP, total foreign debt and costs of borrowing. Bangladesh was ranked 9<sup>th</sup> from the top. Due to adopting continued sound macro-economic policies, our external Debt-to-GDP ratio is still as low as 15%.

According to the latest APA of ERD, the future plans of this division include mobilization of foreign assistance at higher rate for meeting the investment target of



the 8<sup>th</sup> Five Year Plan in the area of infrastructure including power, energy, bridges and roads, ICT, and railways sectors. At the same time, more budget supports and project financing will be sought to address the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. To achieve the SDG targets, persistent efforts will be carried out in mobilizing more foreign assistance in the areas of education, technical education, health and social security sectors. Efforts will be strengthened further to diversify the sources of external resources. Activities related to Green Climate Fund (GCF), South-South Cooperation (SSC), non-resident Bangladeshis (NRB) and LDC graduation will be expanded further.

#### **4.5 Economic Relations Documentation Center (ERDOC)**

ERDOC is the central information repository of ERD. To ensure the implementation of the goals and objectives of ERD, ERDOC arranges for the collection, storage and distribution of various types of foreign and local documents for the purpose of necessary information. In addition, both local and foreign documents including reports are regularly received by the Secretary's office and Wing Chief Offices, are collected by ERDOC.

##### **Financial Agreement:**

Financial agreements are the main materials of ERDOC. Most of the original agreements (technical, grant and loan) signed with various countries and international organizations across the globe are collected by ERDOC for the purpose of supporting foreign finance in the development process.

So far, ERDOC has collected around 3127 agreements. In the financial year 2020-21, 110 agreements were signed by ERD with different countries and agencies like IDA, ADB, JICA, China, France, UNDP, Switzerland, FAO, Germany, AIIB, EU, Netherlands, DFID, Korea, IOM, KFAED, and UNICEF.

##### **Document collection and Services:**

Total collections of ERDOC are more than 16000 including books, periodicals, Magazines, journals, newsletter, gazette etc. Collected documents have been uploaded to the Information Repository System. ERDOC has collected and preserved two leading daily newspapers one Bengali (The Prothom Alo) and one English (The Daily Star). ERD officials, including the Secretary's Office, have received information from time to time from ERDOC. Digital ERDOC information service is available (Information Repository System) at <http://erdpedia.erd.gov.bd>.

##### **Reference Books:**

ERDOC collects many reference books such as Britannica Encyclopedia; Bengali and English Dictionary, Bangladesh Code (Law Code) and annual report of Local and International Organizations, Flow of external resources into Bangladesh (from 1979-2020) etc.

# CHAPTER 5

## PROJECTS UNDER IMPLEMENTATION

### **5.1 Japan Human Resource Development Scholarship (JDS) Project**

Japan Human Resource Development Scholarship (JDS) Project has been implemented by ERD since 2001 and it will be completed in 2025. Total estimated cost of the project is BDT 43108.05 lac in which GoB's contribution is BDT 528.25 lac and Japanese assistance is BDT 42579.80 lac. So far, Japan has provided JPY 6433.00 million as grant for this project. The main objective of the project is to provide opportunity for the Class 1 officials of Bangladesh Civil Service, Judicial Service and Bangladesh Bank to study Masters and Ph.D Courses in Japan to contribute to country's development by applying their knowledge on return.

Under this Programme, 355 officers successfully completed their Master's programme from renowned Japanese universities and returned to Bangladesh. A total of 66 officials of 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and Ph.D (57 for Masters and 9 for Ph.D) are presently studying in Japan. Selection is made through open competition among eligible officers. JDS fellows can pursue Master's and Ph.D Degree in the following areas under JDS Programme:

- Enhancement of Capacity for Public Administrative Government;
- Enhancement of Legal Capacity and Policy;
- Enhancement of Capacity for Urban and Rural Planning and Policy; and
- Enhancement of Capacity for Policy Planning of Public Finance, Investment Management and Economic Growth.

The Government of Japan also provides short term trainings for different Government officials. In FY 2020-2021, 90 officials were provided training through Japanese grants assistance.

### **5.2. Knowledge for Development Management (K4DM) Project**

The UN Wing of ERD has successfully implemented the project titled 'Knowledge for Development Management (K4DM)' for the period January 2015 to December 2020. The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) provided technical and financial (Grant) support to the project. The total cost of the project was BDT 1118.24 lakhs of which BDT 1078.78 lakhs was provided by UNDP and BDT 39.46 lakh by GoB.

The main objective of the project was to promote deep engagement and collaboration among all the stakeholders and support evidence-based decision making.

Specific objectives of the project were:

- Strengthening collaboration between ERD, UNDP and implementing agencies including the line ministries to support better results;
- Successfully leveraging new partnership modalities such as south-south and triangular cooperation, public-private partnership etc. in support of UNDAF results; and
- Ensuring sustained knowledge services such as pipeline of innovative project prototypes, M&E services, operational support services available to all UNDP projects that are being implemented by various line ministries.

### **5.3. Central Coordination Unit of the Private Sector Development Support Project (CCU-PSDSP) for the Financial Year ending at 30 June, 2021.**

#### **Introduction**

In the past, the Government of Bangladesh successfully implemented a series of policies that changed investment climate conditions and accelerated the growth in the country. Bangladesh's own positive experience with the Export Processing Zones (EPZs) and the Government's vision led to take up a project that supported private sector for country's economic growth. The concept of PSDSP, thus, was thought of as the most 'Modern Model' for rapid economic development.

#### **Credit Agreements**

Private Sector Development Support Project (PSDSP) commenced since 2012 with IDA Credit of USD 42.80 million and DFID Grant of USD 17.40 million under 'Original Funding' and the first phase of the project was closed on 31 March, 2017 with 09 months extension of the project. The utilization of fund was 100% and all planned activities were completed successfully. The World Bank, thereafter, provided USD 130.00 million as Additional Financing on request of Government of Bangladesh and the second phase of PSDSP was implemented during financial year (FY) 2016-2021( the project was ended on 28 February, 2021).

#### **Implementing Agencies**

PSDSP was an umbrella project. Three implementing agencies (IAs)- Bangladesh Economic Zones Authority-BEZA, Bangladesh Export Processing Zones Authority (BEPZA) under Prime Minister's Office and Bangladesh Hi-Tech Park Authority (BHTPA) under Information and Communication Technology Division of the Ministry of Posts, Telecommunications and Information Technology through 04 sub-projects implemented the PSDSP both in Phase-1 and Phase-2. Given the multiplicity of implementing agencies (IAs) of the project, a Central Coordination

Unit (CCU) through a project named CCU-PSDSP established at ERD played the role of coordination, monitoring, evaluation and fiduciary functions for smooth and better implementation of the project.

### **Objectives of PSDSP under Additional Financing**

Under additional financing the objective of the PSDSP project was to facilitate private investment and job creation, and promote compliance with international quality standards, building codes, and good social and environmental practices in economic zones supported by PSDSP.

### **The Objective of the CCU-PSDSP Project**

The objective of the CCU-PSDSP project under Additional Financing was to coordinate, evaluate, monitor and perform fiduciary functions for better implementation of the sub-projects' activities.

### **Central Coordination Unit (CCU)**

The allocation of fund for CCU-PSDSP under Additional Financing was USD 1.20 million. But BDT 699.00 lakh was provisioned in the RTAPP (2<sup>nd</sup> revised). As against that amount, BDT 655.00 lakh (USD 0.79 million) was disbursed and BDT 623.00 lakh ( USD 0.74 million) was spent up to 28 February, 2021. In the FY 2020-2021, as against allocation BDT of 98.00 lakh the expenditure was BDT 94.00 lakh (achievement 95.92%).

### **Activities of CCU**

The CCU established within ERD performed the following activities:

- a. Served as the secretariat to the Project Advisory Committee (PAC).
- b. Facilitated and assisted the agencies in inter-department and inter-ministerial coordination.
- c. Prepared all reports- financial, physical and results framework reports (monthly and quarterly) and submitted to IMED, CAO-ERD and World Bank. Carried out refurbishment work in CCU-PSDSP.
- d. Examined, reviewed and assembled an annual work plans submitted by the implementing agencies. Provided procurement and financial management advice to the IAs.
- e. Acted as the single point delivery mechanism of progress reports to the World Bank, as well as monitoring fund flows and utilization, coordinating audit work and submitting withdrawal applications to the World Bank.
- f. Prepared Financial Statement and assisted external auditor and ensured timely response to audits.
- g. Held project progress review meetings with the IAs and CCU-PSDSP's own project.
- h. Coordinated the World Bank Implementation Support Missions and made comments on Aide Memoires and followed them up.

At the close of the CCU-PSDSP project on 28 February, 2021 the project completion report had been prepared and would be submitted to World Bank on 23 August, 2021.

## Conclusion

In our views, amidst Covid-19 pandemic, the CCU-PSDSP played its role significantly, assisted the IAs, reported timely and completed the project successfully.

### 5.4. Support to Sustainable Graduation Project (SSGP):

Meeting the graduation criteria is certainly one of the biggest milestones in our development journey. Graduation will bring new development paradigm and opportunities. Therefore, to make this achievement sustainable— a range of policies, strategies, and programs have been initiated to prepare for this elevation. As part of this, the government earlier formed a National Task Force (NTF) under the leadership of the Prime Minister’s Office for steering and guiding the process of sustainable graduation. To coordinate all the graduation related activities, it was decided in the second meeting of the NTF on 15<sup>th</sup> April 2018 that ERD would undertake a project to identify the impacts of graduation as well as to promulgate this historic achievement at home and abroad by producing various research papers and publications related to graduation for brightening the image of the country. It was also decided that the project would provide necessary capacity-building supports and other necessary supports to the relevant ministries. As per that decision, ERD undertook a project titled “Support to Sustainable Graduation Project (SSGP)” to carry out the aforementioned activities as well as to provide secretarial support to the NTF. The project has four components: i) M & E of LDC sensitive criteria and Policy gap analysis; ii) Capacity enhancement of Data management and Information system; iii) Campaign & Advocacy for graduation; iv) Knowledge management products and tools on sustainable graduation.

The major objectives of the project are to:

- coordinate with all national and international stakeholders for designing a well-prepared transition strategy for smooth and sustainable graduation;
- ensure effective monitoring and supervision of the implementation of graduation preparedness initiatives;
- ensure the development of a smooth transition strategy for sustainable graduation;
- close monitoring and evaluation of the graduation related direct and indirect data and developing a framework for regular assessment of the policy gaps for decision making or policy intervention, as appropriate;
- enhance the capacity of relevant stakeholders, including GoB, CSOs, and trade bodies to cope up with the challenges during and after graduation;
- organize a wide range of campaign programs both at the local and global level for graduating the mindset of the stakeholders and to



sensitize them for creating an enabling environment for graduation with momentum;

- enhance the negotiation capacity of the relevant stakeholders to sustain the International Support Measures (ISMs) significant to Bangladesh's development trajectory and achieving the SDGs by 2030;
- Design and develop knowledge products and tools, including socioeconomic forecasting models that help and sensitize policymakers in decision making and policy intervention.

### Major Progress Achieved in 2020-21

On the eve of the triennial review meeting of CDP in February 2021, the project provided technical support in preparing the Country Statement and the associated Country Report—detailing Bangladesh's position in favour of graduating from the LDC status with an extended preparatory period of 5 years.

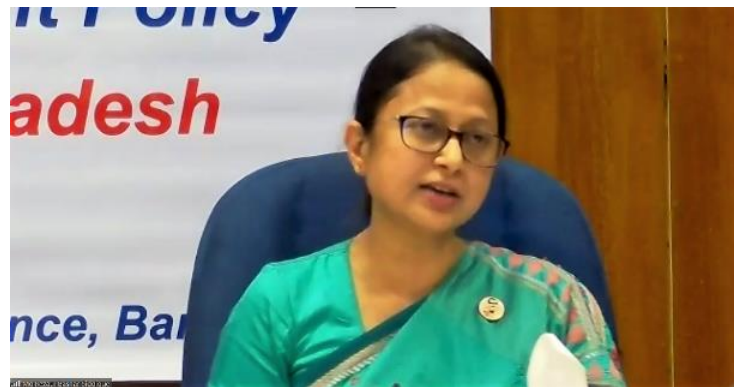

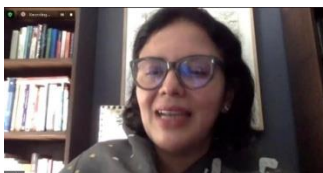

DE wing has coordinated with the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) in preparing the Vulnerability Profile of Bangladesh. The project organized a validation workshop on 10 December 2020 to review and analyze this draft Vulnerability Profile in participation with the relevant stakeholders.

A series of workshops or seminars are being organized by ERD with support from the project at the local level to raise awareness about sustainable graduation and to make the process inclusive. In continuation of that process, an online workshop on “Smooth and Sustainable Graduation: Integrating Local Institutions” was organized on 04 October 2020 in collaboration with the Mymensingh DC Office.

DE wing has organized a webinar in collaboration with the Ministry of Commerce on ‘Trade-related challenges of LDC graduation under changed circumstances due to COVID-19 pandemic: Way Forward’.

In pursuant to the decision taken in the LCG GoB-DP Plenary held on 14 February 2021, SSGP is supporting ERD in forming a Joint Task Team (JTT) for having a consultative framework with representations from relevant entities to prepare Smooth Transition Strategy (STS) and for other graduation related activities.

DE wing has provided necessary comments and feedbacks from the Bangladesh side on the ESCAP report titled 'Towards Sustainable Graduation of South Asian LDCs in the aftermath of COVID-19: Challenges, Prospects and Policy Lessons'.

DE wing with the support of SSGP project has organized a training program on 'Reliable Data Exposure Relevant to Development Synergy' for the officials of the Bureau of Statistics and other relevant government agencies on 28 and 29 December 2020 for enhancing the knowledge and capacity of the relevant officials in compiling and assessing the graduation related data and indicators.

DE wing with the support from the SSGP has organized a consultation with FBCCI on 08 October 2020 on developing possible collaboration between the two sides for ensuring smooth and sustainable graduation.
